Today is State Democratic convention day in Raleigh.

Along about this time eleven years ago the World War veterans were getting home from overseas.

The new tariff bill lately passed by congress has caused the Italian government to retaliate by raising the import duties on automobiles more than 100 percent. That hits one of the biggest industries in this country a stunning blow. There have been and will be others.

Dr. Thurman D. Kitchin, who has distinguished himself as dean of the medical school of Wake Forest college for the past several years was on Wednesday, at a meeting of the trustees in Raleigh, elected president of the college to succeed Dr. Francis P. Gaines, resigned to accept the presidency of Washington and Lee university in Virginia. Dr. Kitchin comes of the famous Kitchin family of Halifax county and is a son of Hon. W. H. Kitchin, one time congressman.

The German Peace Treaty was signed eleven years ago last Saturday. The Germans were against it, spoke of it as a "scrap of paper," and predicted with considerable vehemence that it would not stand. But the Allies placed props about it in the way of an occupation army to help it stand. It grew stronger as the days and years passed, so much so, that the last of the occupation troops left the Rhine a few days ago, leaving the Treaty secure and steady. Likewise, 154 years ago tomorrow, the pact signed by the Continental Congress in Philadelphia was discredited by Great Britain, but she has lived to see the rebellious Colonies grow into the most powerful nation on earth and one which she is proud to call her friend.

Democratic Convention.

Delegates Chosen to State Convention—Speeches—Leo Carr Re-elected County Chairman.

RESOLUTIONS.

The Democrats of Alamance held their county convention in the courthouse last Saturday afternoon. The attendance was not large like the old time rousements that gathered to name the county candidates, but it was 100 percent for undoing what was done two years ago. This sentiment stuck out from every corner from start to finish.

Leo Carr, county chairman, called the convention to order, and Dr. T. F. Opie led in prayer.

Louis C. Allen was called to the chair as temporary chairman and J. D. Kernodle and J. S. Vincent were requested to act as temporary secretaries. The temporary organization was made permanent, and the convention was declared open for business.

Upon motion, A. M. Carroll, Earl B. Horner, E. C. Rumbley, W. S. Harris and A. G. Porterfield were named as committee on resolutions, and submitted the following resolutions which were unanimously adopted:

1. That this convention does with pride recall to the memory of the electorate of this county the last two National Democratic Administrations during which more effective legislation relating to the welfare of the common people was placed on the statute books than had been written for 60 years preceding said administrations and during which time this country enjoyed a type of prosperity the like of which has not been witnessed in any subsequent Republican administration; and that this convention pause to pay respect to the memory of our beloved and distinguished leader during said administrations, Woodrow Wilson, whose spirit moves on and whose example and deeds continue to inspire us and will exalt those who come after us.

2. That this convention go on record as condemning the National Republican administration for

using its governmental authority in the interest of the powerful and the rich and against the interest of the small manufacturers, farmers and laborers of the country, which action on the part of said administration has caused nationwide depression resulting in countless bankruptcies and almost starvation to the farmers and laboring people.

3. That we do hereby endorse the State Democratic Administration and do commend Governor Gardner for the studious and painstaking efforts he has made since his induction in office in the interest of the welfare of our State and all of its institutions, and more particularly do we commend him for his determination to give to the taxpayers of the State an economic administration.

4. That this convention condemns the Republican county administration for general inefficiency in county government and particularly do we call the attention of the voters of the county to the gross negligence of said administration in the conservation of the public improvements of this county, which negligence on their part has cost the taxpayers of the county hundreds of thousands of dollars.

5. That we favor economy in government and we recommend a strict practice of this principle in each department of our county administration and the conservation of all of our public improvements on an economical basis; that we know our candidates to be men of sound judgment and business experience who are eminently fitted to administer our county government in the most efficient and economic manner.

6. That we believe in the principles of Democracy as enunciated by Thomas Jefferson which were put into practice by Andrew Jackson and Woodrow Wilson, and we deplore a government for the benefit of the few, and we verily believe that the interest of the great mass of people is best subserved under a Democratic administration. And this convention does, therefore, appeal to the electorate of Alamance County to cast their votes in the November election for the Democratic candidates from Township Officers to that of United States Senator.

400th Anniversary Augsburg Confession.

The Augsburg Confession of June 25th 1530, is justly regarded as one of the outstanding religious events of the 16th century, and as a forward step for all Protestantism. This anniversary was celebrated on June 25th by a special called meeting of the Synod of the United Lutheran Church in North Carolina with its more than one hundred ministers who held appropriate exercises in observance of the day. Among other interesting features there was an historical address by Dr. W. T. Whitsett of Whitsett, N. C., who traced the influence of this event upon succeeding religious development.

Ten Largest American Cities.
