Question-How can I control blue mold in my tobacco plant beds? Answer-There is no definite means for absolute control but the losses may be reduced through the following practices, Place the plant bed in a warm, well-drained area and sow seed at varying intervals so as to have plants developing at different times. Do not transplant infected plants. Leave these in the bed and apply from two to thre pounds of nitrate of soda about twice a week to each 100 square yards of bed. Keep the plants well watered and wait until they have developed new leaf foliage and a root system before transplanting.

Question-When and how should soils be prepared for flower gardeps?

Answer--Begin preparing the soil as early as possible after the last frost, Cover the plot or bed with three or four inches of stable manure containing very little litter. Mix the manure into the soil and apply acid phosphate at the rate of one quarter pound to the square yard of bed. This treatment with one or two side dressings of some readily avail-
