Three more states, Minnesota, Colorado and Maryland, voted for repeal of the 18th Amendment Tuesday, all carrying for repeal. So far 29 states have voted—all in favor of repeal, leaving only seven more to make the three-fourths necessary.

Upon tobacco sales warehouses taking a holiday, machinery was set in motion to relieve the situation and the matter taken up with the authorities in Washington. A plan has been worked out for acreage reduction which is favorably received, and the prospect is that warehouses will soon open again.

There is strong intimation that there will be reasonable inflation of the circulating medium. Some economists have come to the conclusion that there is not enough money in circulation to carry on the business of the country. This notion appears to be gaining in favor and is not looked upon with antagonism in official circles in Washington.

That recovery may come surely and steadily it is vitally important that NRA should have the support of everybody—manufacturer, producer and consumer. It is not a class affair; it is an honest effort to get the whole country back on its feet. There are bootleggers and racketeers who are out for all they can get regardless of what becomes of the other fellow, and these are the ones that the government will have to lay hands on.

Cuba has been operating a whirling government. In less than two months the Island has had two presidents, a commission, and another president. If revolution means turning or a change, then that's what Cuba has had. The latest president is a university professor, Gau San Martin. He would do well not to resign his professorship, for he is liable to be out of a job as president on short notice, since the Islanders are restless and talking about recalling De Cespedes, his predecessor.

Every Durham County dairyman selling his milk at wholesale prices has joined the Tri-County Association to secure fair marketing practices.

A new pure bred Holstein bull calf has been purchased by the Mills Home at Thomasville to head the herd of 100 Holstein cows on the farm.

Korean and Kobe lespedeza planted in Burke County demonstrated the ability to make a fair growth during a long period of scant rainfall this summer.

E. O. McMahan, county agent of Lee County, reports that Kobe lespedeza stood the dry weather of the past summer better than other varieties planted in the county.

W. L. Adams, county agent of Wilson county, says 100 percent of the new squares, being formed on cotton in his county is being punctured by boll weevils, due largely to the cloudy, rainy weather recently.
