Florida voted Tuesday about four to one for the repeal of the 18th Amendment. Thirty-three states have voted without a break.

Dr. Walter D. Toy, one of the State's best known educators, died Tuesday evening at his home in Chapel Hill after only a few days illness. He was the 25 h anniversary of the church. oldest professor at the University in point of years and service. He would have been 79 years old on Nov. 13th.

Question-What can be done in the fall to control boll weevits? Answer-One of the most important things is the destruction of cotou staiks immediately after the las. picking. The quicker the a.a.ks are destroyed the better the cout.o. This method of couprot has the added feature of being cheap and is just as exfecure as dusting with calcium a.senace in that it destroys the hiberna ing and feeding places. Destroying the stakes will not only kill a certain percentage of the weevels but win also control many other insects that inles cotton fields.

Question-Is a brick brooder tetter of North Carolina, that the commercial brooder and building one?

Answer-Probably not better out just as good and much cheaper. The brick brooden is a recen development in North Carolina but thousands of good poultrymen have found them satisfactory. They a.e easily constructed from brick or from some found on the farm and the fire hazard is not so gree. Plane for building .. these brooders may be obtained by writing the poultry depart ment at State Collegee.

Question-Is it too late to sow small grain on plowed up coaton land?

Answer-No, Almost any of the small grain crops may be puin between now and October 20 For poor and oats should be sown and many farmers, especialy in the lower Pledmont and Coas at plain section could grow some wheat, This latter crop, however, should be grown for home use so as not to conflict with the wheat reduction cam pagn. On the better clay soils balley may be sown. Both oats and barley should be gotten in by October 15th, if possible, with Novembetr 1st as outside limit for all three crops,
