Florida voted Tuesday about four to one for the repeal of the 18th Amendment. Thirty-three states have voted without a break.

Dr. Walter D. Toy, one of the State's best known educators, died Tuesday evening at his home in Chapel Hill after only a few days illness. He was the oldest professor at the University in point of years and service. He would have been 79 years old on Nov. 13th.

Maj. L. P. McLendon, former able Solicitor of this Judicial District, is to leave Durham. He goes to Greensboro as a partner in the law firm of Brooks, McLendon and Holderness. The late E. S. Parker, Jr., was a partner of Brooks and Holderness. Maj. McLendon has been a leading lawyer in Durham since the World War.

Greensboro and Raleigh are at grips over the location of the office of Collector of Internal Revenue. The office has been in Raleigh for many years. Congressman Umstead is reported favoring the removal to Greensboro, which takes it out of another and puts it in his district. If the Raleigh people had a vote when Mr. Umstead runs again they, no doubt, would retaliate.

Timely Farm Questions
Answered at State College.

Question—What can be done in the fall to control boll weevils?
Answer—One of the most important things is the destruction of cotton stalks immediately after the picking. The quicker the stalks are destroyed the better the control. This method of control has the added feature of being cheap and is just as effective as dusting with calcium arsenate in that it destroys the hibernating and feeding places. Destroying the stalks will not only kill a certain percentage of the weevils but will also control many other insects that infest cotton fields.

Question—Is a brick brooder better than the commercial brooder and where may plans be secured for building one?
Answer—Probably not better out just as good and much cheaper. The brick brooder is a recent development in North Carolina but thousands of good poultrymen have found them satisfactory. They are easily constructed from brick or from stone found on the farm and the fire hazard is not so great. Plans for building these brooders may be obtained by writing the poultry department at State College.

Question—Is it too late to sow small grain on plowed up cotton land?
Answer—No, almost any of the small grain crops may be sown in between now and October 25. For poor land oats should be sown and many farmers, especially in the lower Piedmont and Coastal plain section could grow some wheat. This latter crop, however, should be grown for home use so as not to conflict with the wheat reduction campaign. On the better clay soils barley may be sown. Both oats and barley should be gotten in by October 15th, if possible, with November 1st as outside limit for all three crops.

Nine Macon county farmers have dug and filled trench signs within the past few weeks.

From one to two tons of bright yellow are reported Caldwell county growers.

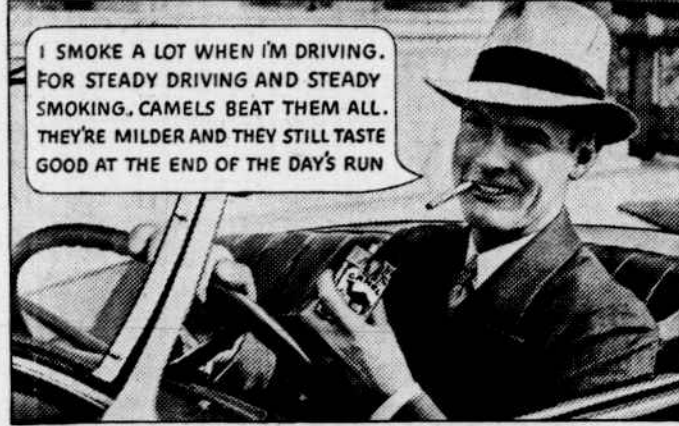
