Eighteenth Doomed Tuesday.

Six states voted Tuesday on the repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment as follows: Pennsylvania and Ohio, over-

whelming for repeal; Kentucky and Utah, for re-

peal, majorities safe, but not overwhelming;

South Carolina, repeal turned down by about 3,000;

North Carolina, majority against repeal over 150,000.

It stands now 37 states for repeal, one over the necessary three-fourths.
