The long drouth in the great wheat-growing area of the northwest became acute a few days ago. Clouds of dust billowed over thousands of square miles and drifted hundreds of miles beyond. It looked like the crop was doomed and prices soared. Late rains have vastly improved the prospects.

Congressman Wm. B. Umstead, candidate for the re-nomination to succeed himself, is requesting the support of his friends in the June primary. He is detained in Washington on account of important business pending in Congress and feels that it is his duty to be there, therefore he will not be able to make a canvass of this district and see his friends.

On Tuesday an election was held in Burlington to permit a property tax levy for the support of the city schools. The measure failed to carry. The vote was against the registration, as provided by law in such cases, and not voting meant a vote against the measure. The large property owners who pay the bulk of the taxes were for the defeat of the proposition. Just why parents will deny to their children the benefits which others are willing to pay for is not only passing strange but woefully shortsighted.

The Luke Leas, senior and junior, after more than three years battling in the courts over charges against them in the disastrous failure of the Central Bank & Trust Company of Asheville, were clothed in stripes at the State prison last Thursday. For the younger Lea his step-mother has filed application with the Governor for pardon or commutation of sentence of two to four years in prison or a fine of \$25,000. The plea is based on his age, 21 or 22, at the time, and physical condition. Her interest and concern is worthy of the best of natural mothers.

The Nature of Braille
Six dots, arranged like the six dots of a domino, give the blind a key which opens out for them the whole range of literature and music. By cutting out one or more of these dots, sixty-three different combinations can be formed, and the inter-combinations possible are innumerable. This is the famous Braille system, called Braille after its inventor, and it is used by blind readers and writers in every part of the world. The sixty-three combinations allow sufficient variety to cover any ordinary alphabet and also the punctuation marks and contractions. They can also be applied to numerals and music symbols. A thorough knowledge of the Braille system can be acquired by a few weeks' study, and proficiency in reading—performed by the fingers—is obtainable after about six months.—Montreal Herald.

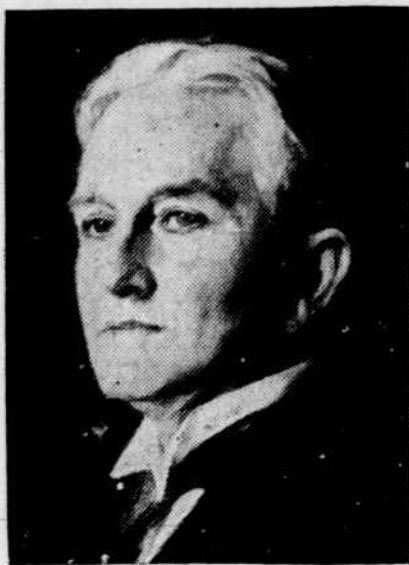
Soviet Opens Eskimo School
