Experts testify that a few solliers marching over a long bridge in egular step might produce more vieration than a whole regiment out of tep. Usually troops are ordered to 'rout step" before starting over a ridge.

Yellow of Eye Most Sensitive The blind spot of the retina of the eye where the optic nerve enters is familiar to most persons as being a spot on the retina where there is no sensibility to light. Yet each eye has a yellow spot, points out a director of the Better Vision institute, which is in the center of the retion and which is most sensitive to light of the entire retina, "It is with this soot that our ision is directed," he says in an article in The Salt Lake Tribune. we fix our eye on a line of printed matter, the center of the line is distinctly and sharply seen, but the words toward the end of the line are vague.

Making Images of Buddha In line with the process used by the Japanese to Induce pearls to grow within the shells of oysters by the insertion of small bits of a foreign substance that eventually become pearl coated, is the method employed in creating the sacred clam shells that Chinese Buddhists believe to have a miraculous origin. These curious shells have small fat images of Buddha appearing as raised designs on their inner surfaces. The images have the same pearly luster of the shell linings and are really a part of the linings, showing no break or joint. In making one of these curies a clam shell is pried open for the insertion of a thin metal image. It is then closed and the clam returned to the water where it is left until enough new shell has been formed to cover the image with a varnish of pearl 340.42 159 87 thick enough to hide the metal, at the same time fastening it to the shell.

#### SEMINOLES PLAN TO SETTLE IN MEXICO

Irked by Growing Shortage of Space in Oklahoma.

Wewoka, Okla,-The Seminole Indian tribe's council house has been moved from Wewoka, old tribal capital, into the country to become a farmer's dwelling.

The move was made while the tribal chieftains considered going on another "Trail of Tears" similar to the long trek- that brought them here from Florida in 1831.

Three hundred Seminole braves, disheartened by seeing their once "happy hunting grounds" of central Oklahoms spront oil derricks and turn to industry, have practically determined to move to old Mexico—far from oil riches and the rush of an industrial civiliza-

They want to get back to the open spaces, and have begun negotiations for another hunting ground in Sonora. The old brown council house, which once stood in the center of Wewoka had been partly dismantled. Recently the last of it was moved to the Law rence Youngblood farm.

Within the last 30 years, the 14 bands of chieftains, each with a first and second band chief and a lawmaker, sat in the old council house to dispense tribal justice among their

Gov. John F. Brown, first chief of the Seminoles, dispensed a strict justice from within the council Lawbreakers were whipped at a tree now standing near the Seminole county courthouse. No jails were found with-in the Seminole nation, only the whip-

A hard lashing was usually sufficient for malefactors. A third conviction resulted in death under the Seminole unwritten laws.

Seminole justice was swift, strict, and unflinching, but malefactors were not taken away from their families and the dependents left in want.

If the wrongdoer reformed, as usually was the case, he was accepted in the tribe again. If he was incorrigible, he was put to death.

In the old council house, many brave went on trial, and death sentences were meted out to the worst The house was moved a number of time, first making the long, tortuous journey along the Trail of Tears.

#### Cavemen Given Credit for Many Modern Words Stanford University, Calif.-If you

This the ory had its rise in discovery of a similar rune stone in Minnesota some thir ty years ago, says the San Francis Chronicle. This discovery was hooted by skeptics as a fake. Much pla ible evidence has been presented by both supporters and opponents of the Nordic claim, as well as by others who uphold the theory that Asians preceded any Europeans in American covery, this apart from evidence that the American Indians did not spring from the soil, but came by way of Bering Straits.

# Very Old City in Bolivia

When the Spaniards entered the re gion now known as Bolivia they fo very old city, Tiahuanaco, near Lake the buildings were held in place with great silver and copper staples. Plun ler being the object of the Spaniards they aried these metal staples loose and erried them off, leaving the massive walls to topple. It is difficult to judge the age of the city.

The ancient Tiahuanacotans used a sun dial, and a German scientist and astronomer has made calculations to determine how far the axis of the earth has shifted since their sun dial stood in its proper relation to the poles. At first he used a formula adopted by the French Society of As tropomers, and he obtained 12,000 years as the city's age.

# "Life" Sentences

The term "life" sentence in a per tentiary has different meanings in different states. Each state has its own interpretation of the term, and some states literally make the convict serve to the last day of his life, while oth ers give a lesser sentence. In Callfornia, for example, there is a minimum sentence of 20 years with the possibility of the convict getting out before the end of his natural life. In York, on the other hand, the convict must serve his entire life.
