Alamance County Sunday School Convention.

The Annual County Sunday School Convention for all the Sunday Schools of all Denominations in Alamance County will be held in Cane Creek Friends' church, on Tuesday, August 7, 1934.

This Convention is held under the joint auspices of the Alamance County and the North Carolina State Sunday School Associations. The Rev. Shuford Peeler, General Secretary, Miss Myrtle A. McDaniel, newly elected Director of Leadership Training, and Miss Edith Krider, Director of Young Peoples' Work of the State Association will be present and take an active part in the entire program.

He will take some pictures of sites offered; report on availability, desirability and convenience to patrons of the office and any matters which would contribute to the mutual advantage of the patrons and the Postoffice department.

So far as antagonizing anybody, or any group, is concerned, that will be avoided just as far as possible. Wherever located it will necessarily be more convenient to some than to others—that's unavoidable.

In the final analysis, the building should be, and it is believed it will be, located where it will best serve the public, not only now but for a number of years to come.

May be another will follow Mr. Hoback to check up on the situation, so that the locating authority will be able to dispose of the matter more easily.
