State College Answers Timely Farm Questions

Question: What are the exact dates for Farm and Home Week at State College this year? Answer: The meeting will be

officially opened with an evening program on Monday, July 29, and continue through Friday, August 2nd. Registration offices will be open all day on July 29 in the Y. M. C. A. for women without their husbands or for single women, and in Pullen Hall for men and couples. Rooms will be assigned in dormitories on the campus or at Meredith College.

Question: When should lespedeza be cut for hay? Answer: Lespedeza should be cut when it attains a height of 15 inches or when the plant is in full bloom. For the Korean variety, this is usually from August 1 to 15 and about 15 days later for the other varieties. Cutting later than this will reduce the quality of the hay and cause the loss of the leaves. Early cutting will also permit of enough second growth to reseed the land.
