ANENT THE WAR

Within a week's time so much of thinking interest takes place on the world's battle fronts that a small volume would hardly suffice to give a brief outline.

Millions of men are engaged in deadly combat on hundreds of miles of battle fronts. Thousands of ships are plowing the waters of oceans and seas doing their part in the great drama. Thousands of air craft fly high to drop missiles of death and destruction on towns and cities and munition plants.

On the German-Russian battle line stretched across a continent the most active operations are found with the Russians driving the enemy from their soil, with many miles still to go.

American and British armies on the east and west of Italy are driving the German armies out of that country.

Leaving Europe for the southwest Pacific we find the armies and the sea and aircraft of the United Nations driving the Japs from their island installations with deadly results, like to that of the allies against the Germans in Europe.

Everywhere the allied forces are giving a good account of their performances.

So well are they doing that predictions persist that the end will come in a few months.

Should the end come within a year, it would be a most wonderful achievement.

Alamance Bond Sales Nearly \$250,000 Over Quota.

L. J. Blackey, chairman of the third war loan drive in Alamance county and president of the National Bank of Burlington discloses that he had received a report from the Federal Reserve bank that by October 2, the date of the expiration of the war bond campaign, this county had turned in \$3,242,801.25 in war bonds.

The county quota was \$2,954,000.

Service Center and Canteen Group

The center is open from 4 o'clock Saturday afternoon till 10 p. m. Sunday and closed on other days.

Bethany Presbyterian Church Dedicated Sunday

The new Presbyterian church at Bethany, two miles south of Graham, was dedicated at an all-day service last Sunday.

The dedication sermon was preached at 11 o'clock by Dr. George Summy of New Orleans, La., who organized a Sunday school there in the early 1880s while he was the pastor of Graham Presbyterian church. That was more than 60 years ago. It was fitting that Dr. Summy could be secured to dedicate a church where he had sown the first seed. At the time there was a public school house there for the district school. Ten years later, in May, 1892, a church was organized with 15 members. One of the members is still there and a deacon in the church, and the membership is now over 200. Since the church was organized a community of several hundred has grown up, principally between the site and Graham.

A small frame building served for a church prior to the erection of the present splendid brick edifice.

From the organization till now pastors of the Hawthlands and Graham churches have served as pastors.

At present Rev. W. E. Harrop, pastor of the Graham church, is the pastor and has been since 1925.

After the morning service dinner was served on the grounds and a slab inscribed with important dates was placed in the wall in an afternoon service.

Attending the service were Dr. Donald W. Richardson, who holds the chair of missions at Union Theological seminary, Richmond, and is the present moderator of the general assembly, and Dr. E. E. Gillespie, superintendent of home missions Synod of North Carolina.

The erection of the new church was begun in the spring of 1940, and is composed of an auditorium on the first floor, and a basement under the whole church with classrooms, the whole being heated by a steam plant and stoker, and with the convenience of water in the building.

The estimated value of the property is \$25,000 and is free of debt.

Rationing News

Fuel Oil—1942-43 fuel oil coupons marked "Period 5" will expire on September 30. Renewal 1943-44 change making and inventory reserve coupons are valid for the amount stated on the face of the coupons from July 1, 1943, through September 30, 1944, and "Period 1" coupons are good for 10 gallons per unit through January 4, 1944.

Tires—Applications far exceed quotas and the board is only able to issue certificates for new Grade 1 tires to most essential users. Holders of "A" books only are ineligible for any type tire.

Gasoline—"A" book coupons No. 6 are good for three gallons each and must last until November 8 in North Carolina.

Loose Stamps—Loose stamps (except accompanying mail orders and the one-point red stamp used for change) are worthless.

Blue Stamps U, V and W may be used from September 1st to October 20, 1943, inclusive. Blue stamps X, Y, and Z are good until November 20.

Meats and Fats—Brown stamp C in ration book 3 may be used from September 26 to October 30; stamp D from October 3 to October 30; stamp E from October 10 to October 30; stamp F from October 17 to October 30.

Sugar—Stamp No. 14 is good for five pounds of sugar to November 1, 1943. Stamps Nos. 15 and 16 in War Ration Book One now valid for 5 pounds of sugar each, for use in home canning. They are good through October 31. Housewives may apply at local board for supplementary sugar rations for home canning, if essential.

Shoes—Stamp 18 in war ration book one is good indefinitely for one pair of shoes. No. 1 "Airplane" stamp in ration book three will be good November 1 for one pair of shoes.
