Burlington Votes Next Tuesday for Larger Corporate Limits

Burlington is voting next Tuesday on enlarging the corporate limits. The voters inside the present limits and those in the territory proposed to be taken in will decide the proposition.

If the election is favorable to the plan it will come near doubling the city's present population of more than 12,000, and increase the area from two and a fraction square miles to more than seven squuare miles.

There is considerable population outside the present limits on all sides, and the added area will make it rank along with the largest in the state.
