GASOLINE A-9 coupons, now valid, will expire May 8.

MEATS, FATS Brown V and W (Book 3) expire February 26. Brown X (Book 3) now valid expires February 26. Brown Y (Book 3) now valid will expire March 20.

PORK Red stamps A-8 through M-8 (Book 4) (120 points) valid in advance to purchase pork from farmers only, not from retail stores.

SHOES No. 18 (Book 1) valid indefinitely. Plane stamp No. 1 (Book 3) now valid.

SUGAR Sugar stamp No. 30 (Book 4) good for five pounds. Expires March 31. Sugar stamp No. 40 (Book 4) good for five pounds of canning sugar until February 28, 1945 (13 months).
