PRODUCTION ABOVE PRICE

Government price fixing policies are blamed for wide fluctuations in farm income, both as between products and different regions of the country. Income from some products has soared, while income from others has risen only slightly. Costs of producing all farm products have shown large increases.

But the farmer has worked long hours and kept up production under handicaps and inequalities which would have been considered ruinous to far less essential war activity. The American farmer does not plan his total productive effort on a wage and hour basis—he still produces as an independent citizen who is trying to save his independent way of living even if he has to work longer and make less than those who produce only for a "price."

Scabby Face

One way to prevent "scabby face" (infectious dermatitis), a skin infection usually beginning at the corners of the mouth and extending slowly over the face and body of suckling pigs, is to move farrowing houses from old, contaminated lots to clean ground.

It may also be helpful to clip the tusks of baby pigs to prevent them from injuring each other, since such wounds are often important sites of entry for the infectious agent, says the department of animal pathology and hygiene, University of Illinois college of agriculture.

If the disease does appear, some of the affected pigs may be saved by a daily treatment with 3 per cent creosol applied with a medium-stiff brush. However, this treatment must start early, the department warns.

CANNED FOODS
Blue A-8 through K-8 now valid at 10 points each, for use with tokens. Good indefinitely.

FUEL OIL
Period 4 and 5 coupons (10 gals.) expire Sept. 30.

GASOLINE
A-9 coupons, now valid will expire May 8.

Notice: Rationing rules now require that every car owner write his license number and state in advance on all gasoline coupons in his possession.

MEATS, FATS
Red A-8, B-8, C-8, D-8, E-8, F-8, G-8, H-8, J-8, K-8, L-8, and M-8 (Book 4) now valid at 10 points each, for use with tokens. Good indefinitely.

SHOES
Stamp No. 18 (Book One) expires April 30. Airplane Stamp No. 1 (Book 3) valid indefinitely. Airplane Stamp 2 (Book 3) may be used for buying one pair of rationed shoes beginning May 1.

SUGAR
Sugar stamp No. 30 and 31 (Book 4) good for five pounds indefinitely.

Sugar stamp No. 40 (Book 4) good for five pounds of canning sugar until February 28, 1945 (13 months).
