NORMAL COLLEGE.—Randolph County, N. C. This institution is situated four miles from "High Point" on the North Carolina Rail Road, about one mile from the Western Plank Road, and eighteen from Greensboro. The buildings which are now finished consist of an elegant brick edifice, three stories high, and of ample dimensions, well finished and furnished, together with extensive boarding arrangements both public and private. The Apparatus, made by Chamberlain and Ritchie, of Boston, is of the very best character; the Museum and all other appliances properly belonging to a College, are such as shew spirit of the age demands.
