

THE TAX IN KIND .- The Hon. James L. Pagh, of Alabama, has recently written a concise elucidation of the tax law of the last Congress. Mr. Pugh is one of the ablest men in the Confederate House of Representatives, and his views will be read with peculiar interest throughout the country at this time :

BRUNDIDGE, July 11, 1863. Mr. Editor :- You will please publish work out for our own good. ' Amid shouts the following propositions on taxation and
