THE TAX IN KIND.—The Hon. James L. Pugh, of Alabama, has recently written a concise elucidation of the tax law of the last Congress.

1. No direct tax on land and slaves can be laid by Congress without an apportionment. Representation and direct taxes are inseparable.

2. A tax on property instead of production would necessarily oppress the citizen and soldier, because the tax, in order to be uniform, must be laid on the land of the soldier as well as the citizen who has been driven from his home by the enemy and under the hammer to pay taxes.

3. The provision tax, or in kind, can oppress no one; as no person pays anything for the land he occupies, whereas, the tax on property must be the same on every one, and paid in money, whether the land makes provisions or grass and weeds.

4. Whether you lay a tax on property or a tax in kind, it must be the same on every body, because if the property or crops of any one, whether citizen or soldier, is exempted, uniformity is destroyed and the tax is unconstitutional.

5. The provision tax of one tenth is all the planter pays while incomes from speculation, &c., are taxed as high as fifteen per cent.
