Farmer's Repository.

ON CORN PLANTING.
 To the President and Members of the Agricultural Society of South Carolina.
 GENTLEMEN—The season having advanced so far, is my reason for addressing you through the medium of a public print, instead of laying my communication before your Society.
 I have, for some years past, paid particular attention to the management of my Corn crops, and having through these years, made several important observations from various experiments tried, and the result having materially contributed to my own interest, I respectfully submit the same for your consideration, in the hope that, by their dissemination, some benefit may accrue to some of my brother planters. I am particularly obliged to this step, from a conviction that nine-tenths of the Corn bought by our Planters, could be dispensed with, and the product of their Rice and Cotton fields sustain no alteration, or at any rate, a very trifling one. And I am the more inclined to make my statement, because I have seen no communication that has presented the matter in the way I wish to do. Many of these gentlemen who have made communications to your Society, are personally known to me, and for all of them I feel the profoundest respect; but as their experiments are all of them, so very expensive, that they could never be carried into general use, I respectfully beg leave to differ with them. And, although, all that I shall state, may be well known to very many, yet it may be as certain, that there are some to whom it is unknown, or there would not be so much Corn purchased in the State; and to such, I cordially tender my services.
 In preparing or selecting manure, the nature of the soil must, of course, be attended to. Pine trash, or other trash collected in the woods, cotton seed, and cow-pen manure, will answer for any soil; but barn-yard and stable manure, whilst they are the very best for clay lands, or low cold soils, are but ill adapted to high and light or sandy soils, and although they might be beneficial in a very rainy season, yet in a common or dry season, they will certainly be injurious, or even destructive. Cotton seed, when green, I class among the first named manure, but if rotted, among the latter.
 In planting my Corn, I prefer my beds or rows five feet apart; I think that distance is quite close enough, as well as quite wide enough; and I am decidedly in favor of single stocks, from two to two and a half feet apart. In most fields, more corn will be made by the stocks standing two feet apart. When corn is planted, leaving two or three stocks in a hill, and these hills five feet apart, I have frequently observed stocks of corn with no appearance of an ear. This may be caused by the roots of one stock drawing from the others all the virtues of the soil around them; but it is otherwise sometimes, for I have known the form of an ear to shew itself, and even seen the silk protruded from its top; but after a while the whole has disappeared. This I have ascribed to the stocks being so crowded together, that the blades of the corn effectually secured the silk from the influence of the sun, the dew and the fuma, whereby its umbilical uses were totally precluded, and hence, also, the vacant places we see sometimes on the cob. I once rode with a neighbor through my field of corn, of forty acres, planted single stock: we found but one stock without an ear, although we searched closely for some time; we then went into his field, of twenty acres, and planted with two stocks in a hill, and we soon found six stocks with no appearance of an ear. The corn in both fields looked equally well.
 In regard to manuring corn, I am clearly of opinion, that there is a certain quantity only that is truly advantageous; all over that, may be not only superflu-
