DATA SHOT, WILMINGTON, N. C., May 5 .-- This morning six negro boys, from 13 to 17 years old, were at the wharf of the Wilmington Compress, preparing to go across Cape Fear river to shoot rice birds. One, named Grant Best, from a negro man, which, he says had no case on the tubes, and he did not know it was flashed. While in the act of blowing out one of the tuber the hammer fell and one barrel was discharged metably killing Ed. Smith and B. Fillyaw, and Ben Bonoly, Ed. F. B Nettles, and El. Fillyay were also shot and died soon after. NEW LAWS.

Through the courtesy of Senator Collie, we have been enabled to get a copy of the Captions of the laws enacted by the last Legisla ture. In looking over them we gleaned out the following which pertain to this immediate section :

An act to regulate the sale of seed cotton. It shall be unlawful to buy or sell seed-cotton unless persons buying shall enter in a book the date of transaction, persons selling, amount and price, book to be kept open for inspec-Persons violating to be guilty of misdemeanor within justices jurisdiction. When sale is proven burden of proof upon defendant to show that record was

keptieren well out men An act to prevent fast driving over Louisburg bridge. Penalty \$10 for driving faster than a walk! Act extending the limits of the town of Youngsville, and the day

An act giving the County Commissioners the power to levy a special tax (not to exceed 8 cents on the hundred dollars) for support of poor.

An act was also passed amending the code in regard to impouning stock. Impounder can charge only 10 cents for impounding and 10 cents a day additional for feeding.

Mr. Gladstone is biding his time. He has his hand upon the Euglish pulse. He knows what the condition of Scotland and Wales is as to the land reform. When England is feverish for reform, as it will be, then he wil move for reform in England. He is for reform for the Kingdom. In the meantime Toryism is expending all its energy and malignant spite in devising ways and means for Ireland's oppression .-Wilmington Star .-
