These men are as likely to be led by the demagogue, the crank or sore headed croaker as by men of stability-conservative men of business judgment and de-

The man who will let the wind change his course, or runs as soon as he sees smoke will never be a soldier in any victorious battle. He must be a stayer. He must enlist to fight to win or die, or the reward that comes to the unfa!tering and courageous will never be his.
