Weevils in Grain.

Numerous remedies have been tested and recommended for weevils in grain bins. One of the weevils are in the grain as certain a remedy as any is probably bisulphide of carbon introduced into the bin, which is then covered to confine the vapor.

In this as in many other cases the best remedy is a preventive. When possible avoid storing grain in bins that have been infested. When it is practicable to change the place of storage fumigate the grain with burning sulphur.
