The State Chronicle knows how to appreciate good men. That paper is always the friend of Franklin county enterprises and Franklin county men. In a recent issue it contained the following allusion to Franklin county politics:

The State Chronicle seems to be an assured fact, and as the town has been aroused from its long slumber, we would suggest some other needed improvements. Let us have a town of which we are not ashamed. Let us keep pace with our sister towns, Henderson, Oxford and Durham, let us have electric lights—the hall and town would look so well lighted by electricity. And we should have water works, let me utilize the beautiful Tar, and then we need a fire engine, as it is now, we are defenseless against a fire. And we need a good market house, and a nice Mayor's office, and the town should be well governed; we should have a chief of police and three good assistants for day, and we reckon two would do for night duty; and it would be well to have the street paved from in front of the Hotel down to the bridge, and around court square, as the streets get so very muddy in the winter, and we have the rock right here convenient. A CARD.

To Friends.—For better from me to array any class of citizens against another, but I am and have been since I left a school engaged to any and all combinations against the people, but in these days of abominable combinations and unmerciful trusts, it has become necessary for us to unite to protect ourselves from these robbers and hence the formation of the "Alliance." The purpose of this article is not to injure any one but to see whether or not you are treated as others are and charged the same for ginning your cotton, that merchants give, and hence I make the following statements and would like to know if you farmers get as good terms.

Messrs. W. J. Neal & Co's store is within 75 yards of my god, and they and myself are on good terms—perfectly friendly. I gin for the 20th and furnish bagging and ties at cost, which I think is little enough for the work. The Mill Company at Louisburg 13 miles away, offered Mr. Neal to gin his cotton for the 20th, store his seed, keep them insured, and put them on the cars when he is ready to ship them, all at their expense and then give him a rebate of fifty cents a bale, and also deliver the baled cotton at the warehouse.

Mr. R. H. Griffin, offers to haul

Messrs. Neal & Co's cotton from their cotton house to his without charge, git it for the 20th and carry the bales cotton to Louisville for 50 cents a bale. The Mill Company are merchants, Mr. Griffin is a merchant, I regard them as my friends personally, and if they give you on the above terms, all-right and I have a word of objection, but if they discriminate and charge you more I don't think they are treating you or myself right.

I shall give for all alike and though I love the ginning of Neal & Co's 100 bales cotton, I will not gin a bale for them cheaper than I will for the farmer or tenant who only brings me one bale. I charge all the same for the same work.

If have not stated the terms correctly I am prepared to give my authority which I think is irrefutable. If they give you on the above terms, I shall not be compelled to submit to any in particular to hindrance from any one who has a word of objection, but if they discriminate and charge you more I don't think they are treating you or myself right.

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
