TOWN ORDINANCES.

LOUISBURG, N. C., Sept. 23, '88. Meeting of the Commissioners of the town of Louisville, held on the 23rd day of September, 1888, the following Ordinances were passed and amended:

ORDINANCE 19 was amended as follows: No person shall shoot a gun, pistol or other fire arms unnecessarily, within the limits of the Town, or explode fireworks, or any squibs, crackers, fire rockets, bean or grit shooters, or any fire works in said town, under the penalty of ten dollars (\$10) for each offense. One half of the fine to go to the informer.

ORDINANCE 27 was amended as follows: All Barber shops in the Town shall be closed from Saturday night 12 o'clock, till Sunday night 12 o'clock, and no barber shall carry on his business under a penalty of five (\$5) dollars.

ORDERED, That every owner or lessee of any business house in the Town of Louisville shall be responsible for any disorderly conduct upon his premises or in his house, and every owner or lessee of any business house in the Town who shall permit any disorderly conduct in his house or upon his premises without reporting the same on affidavit to the Mayor of the Town, shall be subject to a fine of ten (\$10) dollars.

ORDERED, That all taxes for the Town of Louisville (except license tax) shall be due and collected on the first day of October in each year and every person failing to pay his taxes by the 31st day of December in every year, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and be upon conviction before the Mayor fined double the amount of said taxes.
