Items of Interest Gathered from all Parts of the State.

The State Medical Society will meet at Elizabeth City on the 16th.

The Newton Enterprise says the prospect is very fine for the wheat crop in Catawba this year.

The Mecklenburg Times says that "one night last week there were no burglaries at all in Charlotte."

The Winston Sentinel reports C. Andrews as saying trials will be running between Winston and Wilkesboro by next Christmas.

The Greensboro North State knows of a lady who tried Bishop Lynn's ginger-wet milk cure for insomnia and had to send for a doctor.

Another large cotton factory been organized in Concord by the Odell Manufacturing Co., with a capital stock of \$5,000. This will make three large cotton factories for that town.

The Salisbury Whelan says the Western North Carolina Railroad has received 52 miles of 60 pound steel rails for the main line between Hickory and Asheville, which will make this line between Hickory and Asheville, an all steel railroad.

Democracy, The Parent of a Tariff.

The advocates of a Protective Tariff are laying stress upon the fact that "Democracy is the parent of a Tariff."

If there is any considerable portion of the Democratic party opposed to a Tariff we are not aware of it. The charge of Republicans, that the Democratic party is in favor of Free Trade is now, and always has been, false. This question is not, shall we have a Tariff? That is settled. Raising revenues by a tax upon imports is the established policy of the government, and no effort is being made for its abolition.

The point in dispute is, what is, and should be, the design and scope of the tariff?

If the tariff is the offspring of Democracy, the parent must see to it that the proper restraints are thrown around the child that it may not bring dishonor on the family, and by extravagance produce want and suffering in the land.

The Democratic party insists that this is a Government for the people, and that whatever tends to monopoly is contrary to its genius and hostile to the purpose of its creation. The Government is not the guardian of a few monopolists and favored industries, but the protector of the men who secure its fortunes in the days of prosperity, and defend its honor in the hour of adversity.

The Democratic party asserts that the Government has no right to take from the people more of their hard earnings than is necessary for the economical administration of public affairs. The Republicans, protesting an expression of opinion on the requirements of the government, directs its energies to the "Protection of Infant Industries," the upbuilding of private fortunes, and the "Protection of American Labor."

It is a monstrousness that the rich must be protected against the tyranny of the poor; that the barefooted mountaineers, and the toilers by the sea, should be taxed to afford luxuries to the manufacturers and the iron kings of Pennsylvania. It is an outrage on common sense to say that the farmer who toils through winter's cold and summer's heat, with no day of rest but the Sabbath, should be taxed to bring gold to the coffers of millionaires and whose only labor consists in clothing his oxen, and whose gain day lasts through the live-long year.

It is the sheerest trifling to say that "Democracy is the parent of a Tariff," and responsible for it. This child of Democracy has grown "too big for his breeches," and the sooner he is brought back to parental discipline the better for the country.

Labor needs no protection. In free America labor protects itself, and no man is so independent as he who goes out into God's blessed sunshine, and with his own right arm, sows the grain and reaps the harvest.—Newberne Journal.
