Rates of Postage.

It is said that postmaster-general Wanamaker is in favor of reducing letter postage from favo cents to one cent. It is very commendable for the great promoted advertiser to be casting about in his mind methods to relieve the publie of its burdens, but it is not well for him to be too hasty in arriving at conclusions as to what the public most de-

A reduction of letter postage from two cents to one cent would not redound so much to the benefit of the masses of the people as it would to the benefit of the great business concerns. It is not the poor people who feel the difference between one-cent and two-cent postage, but it is the large business houses, whose annua. Lill for postage is of considerable size.

What the masses want is that the surplus earnings, if any, of the post office department shall be applied to in_ creasing the efficiency of the service as at present conducted. Let the mails at country places and at the small towns be more frequent and more promptly delivered. Let enough mailing clerks be put in railway service to distribute the mails promptly without wearing themselves out with interminable labor. Let the postal service be reinforced at all its weak points, and then if there is any money left, it will be time enough to make reduction in rates.

A reduction of rates could be appreciated by the few: better facilities would - be appreciated by everybody.

Evils of Smoking,

Dr. F. L. Oswald, in a series of articles against the use of stimulants in good health, gives the following information in regard to the habit:

It would be a mistake to suppose that the baneful effects of the tobacco vice are limited to the disorders of the respiratory organs. Dyspepsia and heart disease are very frequent complications of a habit which in the young stunts the development of the organism so unmistakably as to have attracted the attention even of superficial observers. The examining surgeons of our army and navy rarely accept a youngster whose flaccid muscles and sallow complexion bespeak the effect of nicotine, and no experienced physician will ques tion the wisdom of a by-law by which a French educator proposes to purge the public schools of his country from a life-blighting vice: Private reprintand for the first offense; public reprintand and suspension of privileges for the second; concilium abeundi (marching orders) for the third." The weak eyes of German students are due to nicotine fumes considerably much more than to the fumes of the midnight lamp; and I can give any correspondent the address of a family of six boys, four of whom in spite of parental protest, have become s aves to nicotine, and have ruined their eyes "by a course of study." Which has in nowise affected the bright eyesight of the second and the sixth brother -- the only two who have never ceased to loathe tobacco.
