

An Election With a Lesson.

Nobody is paying much attention to politics this week, but there has been some political news washed down from Connecticut is instructive. It is especially so in connection with the long list of post-office appointments yesterday, "vice so-and-so removed."

About a year and a half after President Cleveland came into office he appointed a Democratic postmaster at Norwich, in place of the Republican incumbent. These terms had expired. This Democratic postmaster conducted the office in a non-partisan way, retaining a majority of the old employees and giving general satisfaction. But Norwich is a Republican town and as soon as the new administration came in it was thought necessary to have a Republican postmaster. The Democratic incumbent, accordingly, was summarily removed and a Republican appointed, not within twenty-four hours after taking possession, removed every Democratic employe except one.

The purpose of this, of course, was to "strengthen the party." It is interesting to observe the sequel. On Monday an election was held in Norwich, and for the first time in the history of the town the Democrats elected their whole municipal ticket, the Republicans even losing control of the City Council. This is the way the party was strengthened by grasping at the spoils.

Another illustration of the value of service pledges, it looks as though they were determined to resent his violation of them, and it would be wise to heed the warnings from Norwich in the future distribution of patronage.
