COTTON BAGGING REJECTED.

AN IMPORTANT STATEMENT FOR THE FARMERS—THE PRESENT QUALITY TOO LIGHT AND A HEAVIER ARTICLE MUST BE USED.

A report comes from New York that is likely to stir up the Farmers' Alliance. It is to the effect that the Northern cotton mills refused to receive cotton-covered cotton bales.

Mr. R. R. Dancy, of Savannah, said: "I am opposed to the use of the cotton bagging, and am perfectly willing to be quoted on it, for it is a miserable substitute for jute."

The Morning News states yesterday that he is recovering the cotton-covered bales with jute bagging.

The Savannah Exchange will meet to-day to consider the New Orleans resolution.

The News adds: "The unfavorable reports of the condition in which cotton covered with the cotton bagging has been received by New England mills, and the dissenting action of the principal exchanges unmistakably point to a rejection of the New Orleans resolution on to-morrow by the Savannah Exchange."

And this will not deter the farmers from using cotton bagging. They will soon have a heavier article, and by next season they will have the jute trust by the throat.

DEPART IN PEACE.

There now seems to be little doubt that the exodus of the negroes from this State to Arkansas and Mississippi is movement made in earnest and deliberately organized.

This confronts us with a very serious question, which becomes us to meet as wisely as may be, and without passion. We have no right, and we do not believe that the majority of our people have any inclination, to interpose obstacles to the betterment of the negro's condition; and, if they can receive higher wages, and live more comfortably elsewhere, they are a free people—let them depart in peace.

One of the most valuable lessons which the improvement movement upon the war has taught the Southern people is that they had the ability to work, and with the realization of this ability the willingness to labor has come—slowly, it is true, but it has come.

To speak plainly, so far as the towns are concerned, the thinning out of their negro population would amount to getting rid of an unutilized nuisance.

The withdrawal of so much colored labor from our farms will at first be a more serious matter. In this case it is simply a matter of "counting noses"; and, work as hard as they may, the whites have not available the bone and sinew sufficient to till the fields and plantations, and raise and harvest the crops.

The gravest evil connected with this contemplated wholesale negro exodus is that the young, strong, and vigorous will naturally be the ones to take leave of us, and there will be left the aged, sickly and infirm to become eventually charges upon the parish.

Important School Notice to the Public.

The following letter sent to J. N. Harris, county Superintendent, with an order to have the same published for the benefit of the public, explains itself:

DEAR SIR:—If you have not already done so, will you please give the matter of exchange of books your special attention. The exchange will not be continued longer than is necessary for you to avail yourself of them.

May I not ask that you see every teacher in your county who sells school-books to get a list of books from Messrs. Hargis & Co., New York, and from Messrs. Van Antwerp, Hargis & Co., Cincinnati, all the books that are offered for exchange as explained on page 59 of the school law.

It is worthy of special attention that to get the books that are offered for exchange no money need be advanced. Any reliable books are to be accounted for when exchanged or sold.

While our people are conservative, they are reasonable. If the teachers will show the importance of uniformity, and that the State list books are better than many of the old books now in the hands of the children, and if they will explain that upon the surrender of the old books the new books can be had for a very small exchange price, most parents will willingly give up the old books.

Especially do I ask that when a new book is bought it shall be one that is on the State list. The parents frequently do not know what books to get. If they do not know they should always wait until the teacher informs them.

It is so great an organization as a State system of schools there will necessarily be some friction, and, perhaps, nobody can have things exactly as he wants them. All that the State Board asks has been most carefully considered by persons who have nothing in view but the good of the children; and when, from long experience, ought to be able to guide that the children may learn as rapidly as possible, and their education be safe and pleasant.
