COTTON BAGGING RE-JECTED.

FARMERS-THE PRESENT QUALI-TY TOO LIGHT AND A HEAVIER ARTICLE MUST BE USED.

A report comes from New York that

ance. It is to the effect that the North-

era cotten mills refused to receive out-ton-covered cot on bales. The news of this boycott on the cotton bagging of the Alliance was first received in Savannah. One of the largest cotton buyers for Northern mills in that city ramilis in New York state last week which was most discouraging to those who have shipped cotton covered with cotton bagging. "It is the first complaint I have ever had from the mills, he said, "although I have been buying for them in this market for twelve years or more." The writer said: "The cot ton came to hand in a very bad condi-tion. Many of the tales covered with the coling sacking have lost twenty to thirty pounds per bale. We do not want any more cotton covered with cotton bagging, notwithstanding the advantage of the fare. We must virtually abandon your market. There was a

Mr. R. R. Dancy, of Savannah, said "I am opposed to the use of the cotton bagging, and am perfectly willing to be quoted on it, for it is a miserable substitute for jute." He went on plain that he was opposed to the cotton bagging not only because it is unfitted to the purpose, but because it is being made at an absolute loss to the planters, and its use, he said, is playing into the hands of the jute bagging manufacturers after all, for they are manufac-

turing the cotton bagging at the New

Orienns bagging factory. Mr. Dancy seems to have had an experience in his first shipment of cottoncovered bales which he is not likely to have repeated, as he informed a Morning News representative yesterday that he is recovering the cotton-covered bales with jute bagging. He shipped some cotton-covered bales to a New England firm by the Baltimore Steamship Line, the steamship company declining to give a clean bill for the cotton-covered bales without a guarantee, which Mr. Dancy gave. Information has been received that the cotton reached its destination in such bad condition that the mills would not receive it, and some of it will have to be carted away in crates to get it from the dock. Mr. Dancy telegraphed his agent to put the cotton in good condition, and he will of course

have to stand the added expense. The Morning News states that the Savannah Exchange will meet to-day to consider the New Orleans resolution. The News adds: "The unfavorable reports of the condition in which cotton covered with the cotton bagging has been received by New England mills. and the dissenting action of the principal exchanges unmistakably point to a rejection of the New Orleans resolution on to-morrow by the Sayannah Exchange. Those who were not inclined to antagonize the resolution two weeks ago will do so now since learning that the mills in the North announce that they do not want cotton covered with cotion covering, notwithstanding the advantage of tare."

And this will not deter the farmers from using cotton bagging. They will soon have a heavier article, and by next season they will have the jute trust by the throat. The cotton bagging now used is undoubtedly too light, but that defect will be remedied in time. Cotton bagging is the future covering for the South's cotton crop. - Charlotte Chrou-
