CONVENTION CALLED.

The Raleigh correspondent of the Wilmington Messenger says: At the Inter-State Immigration convention held at Asheville last December a resolution was adopted requesting the Governors of the various Southern States to call immigration conventions at some suitable time during the present year. The Governor of Maryland has called such a convention and to-day Governor Holt issued a formal call for one. The date is May 13th, and the place Raleigh. Requests for the call came from a number of points in the State. The convention will consider the Inter-State exposition here, the question of immigration and also the matter of joint effort for a great display of the State's resources at the World's fair. It is proposed to join with the State authorities in rendering the display complete. Good work can be done in this direction and very necessary work too, for the \$25,000 appropriated is not enough as all observant people know. It is hoped, therefore, that all sections of the State and all interests will be well represented at the approaching convention. Direct work can be done for the Inter-State exposition. By that date the building for the latter will begin to be in shape.

A DEAD GIVE AWAY.

You think you are going to steal a march on them this year; don't you? Well, you are not going to do any such thing, and if you will just stop to think about it, you will see that you can't. In view of the bad weather that has prevailed for so long, the resolutions of the Alliance to cut down the acreage, and other influences that lead to the end, you would judge that there will be only a small crop of cotton this year; wouldn't you? That being the case, you think it would be a good idea to put forth your utmost efforts to get in as large a crop as possible, so as to make a big haul in the high prices next fall; don't you? ABOUT DEADLY WEAPONS.

According to an act passed by the last Legislature magistrates were given jurisdiction of assault with deadly weapons where no serious damage was done; but the Supreme Court of North Carolina in a recent decision of State vs. Fesperman, handed down by Judge Clark, decided that the act is not operative, and says that the constitution restricts the jurisdiction of magistrates in criminal cases, where the punishment cannot exceed a fine of fifty dollars or imprisonment thirty days, and that therefore, it is not competent for the Legislature to confer jurisdiction upon magistrates of any offences of which the punishment affixed by law may exceed that limit. This decision leaves the magistrates in the same position that they were before the act was passed.

DEMOCRATS JOIN THEM.

The South Carolina Republicans are organizing and a very significant meeting was held in Charleston Thursday.

It was the first white Republican meeting ever held in the State and a large number of citizens were present who have heretofore affiliated with the straightout Democrats.

The dispatch from Charleston to the Atlanta Constitution, giving an account of the gathering goes on to say that "the meeting elected delegates to the Republican league convention, which meets at Cincinnati on the 21st. This movement is regarded with some concern here, taken as it is, in consideration of the repeated declaration of the alliance in favor of a third party. The white Democrats who are in it say that the old Democratic party has been elbowed out of existence by the farmers' movement, and as they will not subscribe to the platform and principles of that movement they will go into the Republican party. There are so many Democrats in this state who are disgusted with the Tillman administration that there is some danger of the move developing into a stampede from the Democratic party as it exists in this state at present.
