How to Treat a Shring Horse.

Do not strike a horse when he You only make matters being hurt. Now, if you strike him he is hor; he associates the barmless brush heap with pain. It is better not to change the tension of the rein at all that is, if you were driving with a loose ne who the animal shied, do not nervously c utch the rein, as if you were frightened also. It will do you no good, for you cannot cather up a loose ine quick enough. If the horse shies very bailly speak to him, and gather the lines easily and firmly. If you were driving with a taut line, which is always shies, but pr ss stead ly and keep cool. -New York Week'r.

Early Set Tobacco the Best.

It is the early bird that catches the worms; so it is the early setting of to bacco plants that succeeds. The number of plants to set to the acre is a question of the moment. If one desires to produce a five last, the number can be made to 10,000 or 11,000; but if a coarser leaf is wanted, set out from 8,000 to 8,500 to the acre. Inasmuch as our growers are striving to compete with Sumatra in producing a leaf of fine texture, it would seem to be good judgment to raise a good many plants on an acre. For instance, plants set out 18 inches apart in rows, and 3 feet and two inches between the rows will make a host of plants on an acre; but if the plants are placed say 20 inches apart in the rows, and 3 feet 2 inches between the rows, the number of plants to the acre will be diminished several thous and, say to 8,125 instead of 10,000 to 11.600. If the plants are set out in straight line, they can be cultivated closely up to the rows; but after plant has grown to moderate size, the routle's begin to spread out into the center of the rows, and such being the case, it is not safe to run the cultivator too near the growing plants in a nmuper to injure the roots.
