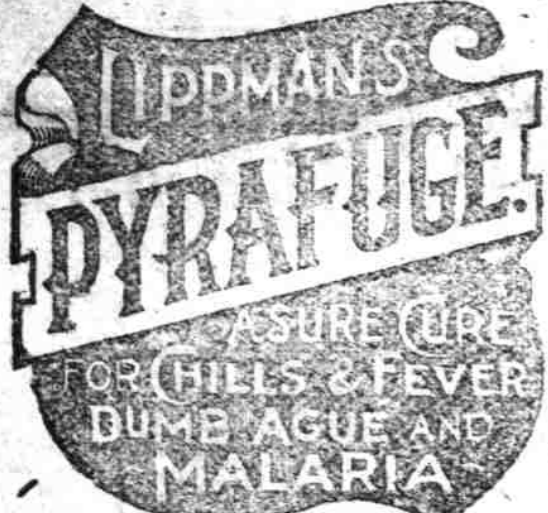

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TOWN LAWS.

AT A MEETING OF THE COMMISSIONERS OF THE TOWN OF LOUISBURG, HELD JULY 2nd, 1891, THE FOLLOWING ORDINANCES WERE ADOPTED FOR THE GOVERNMENT OF SAID TOWN:

Ordinance 1. It shall not be lawful for any live stock to run at large within the corporate limits of the town, to be ridden, driven or fed upon the sidewalks, nor hitched to the trees, pailings or fences on the sidewalks under penalty of one dollar for each offence.

Ordinance 2. Any person who shall drive or ride a horse or a mule at an unusual speed through the streets of Louisville (unless in case of necessity) shall be fined five dollars.

Ordinance 3. Any person who shall leave any horse, mule or ox harnessed to any vehicle, on the streets of the town of Louisville or on the depot yard for the period of five minutes unattended, except when necessary to load or unload carts or wagons shall be fined one dollar for each offence.

Ordinance 4. No person shall exhibit or show any stud horse or jackass, or put a stud horse or jackass to any mare within the limits of the town under penalty of ten dollars for each offence.

Ordinance 5. Any person who shall leave any cart, wagon or vehicle of any kind upon the streets or sidewalks of the town during the night shall be fined one dollar for each offence.

Ordinance 6. No person shall fight chicken cocks within the limits of the town under penalty of five dollars for each offence.

Ordinance 7. If any hog, sheep, or pig shall die within the corporate limits of the town with cholera or any other disease, the owner thereof shall bury the carcass or bury the same at least two feet in the ground within six hours after the notice of the death of said animal—and on failure to do so shall be fined five dollars.

Ordinance 8. The owner of any dead carcass or carrion who shall permit the same to remain within the limits of the town for one day after he has notice of its existence shall be fined two dollars, and one dollar additional for every day the same shall remain. If not removed by the owner, the same shall be removed by the town Constable at the expense of the owner, or at the expense of the town if the owner cannot be found.

Ordinance 9. The Commissioners of the town shall have authority to direct the removal of any pig pen, or any other nuisance within the corporate limits of the town, when in their judgment it shall be necessary for the health or comfort of any portion of the inhabitants of the town, and if the owner or occupant of the premises shall fail to remove said pig pen or other nuisances within three days, after having proper written notice, then he or she shall be fined ten dollars, and the Commissioners may have the same removed.

Ordinance 10. Every owner of a house within the limits of the town shall continually have on the premises one ladder of sufficient length to reach the eaves of such house. Any one failing to comply with this ordinance shall be fined two dollars.

Ordinance 11. Sec. 1. Whenever the shingles of any house within the corporate limits of the town shall become so decayed as to be dangerous on account of fire, the Board of Commissioners may so declare, and the owner or owners of such house shall be required to recover the same within such

time as the Commissioners may think reasonable, under penalty of the sum of ten dollars for neglect to do so.

Sec. 2. Whenever any chimney, stove or stove pipe shall be deemed unsafe or to endanger the safety of any portion of the town it may be so declared by the Town Commissioners and they may condemn and order the removal of the abandonment of the use of the same until it shall be so repaired or reconstructed as to make it safe; and any person who shall use any such chimney, stove or stove pipe after it has been so condemned, shall be subject to a fine of five dollars.

Ordinance 12. No wooden building shall be built within the following limits, viz: within 200 feet of that part of Main street, lying between the Tar river bridge and Eagle Hotel. Within 200 feet of Nash street between Spring street and Terrell's livery stable. Within two hundred feet of Court street. Within 200 feet of Market street. Nor shall any building within said limits be covered with any wooden material.

Ordinance 13. No person shall pile or have piled any manure, timber, wood, or other obstruction whatever (except temporarily for building purposes, and then 20 feet passage shall be unobstructed) upon the streets, public crossings, or sidewalks of the town under penalty of five dollars for each offence.

Ordinance 14. Any person who may have a private crossing or bridge over any ditch or sewer in the streets of the town and shall fail to keep the same open for the passage of water shall be subject to a penalty of one dollar.

Ordinance 15. Any person having a brood out on the streets of the town will be required to have the chips and trash removed immediately, under a penalty of two dollars.

Ordinance 16. Sec. 1. Any person who shall throw or cause to be thrown any trash, wood or other obstruction into the gutters of the streets of the town shall be liable to a fine of one dollar for each offence.

Sec. 2. No person shall sweep, throw or deposit any garbage or trash in the streets of the town under a penalty of one dollar for each offence.

Sec. 3. The occupant of any lot or store house in the town who shall allow any garbage or trash to be swept, thrown or deposited on the streets or in the ditches, shall be subject to a fine of one dollar for each offence.

Ordinance 17. Sec. 1. Any person who shall cause or commit any nuisance around any dwelling or other house within the corporate limits of the town shall forfeit and pay the sum of five dollars for each offence.

Sec. 2. No person living in the town shall allow any nuisance to exist on his or her premises, and any person failing to abate any nuisance on his or her premises when ordered to do so by the Mayor or town policeman shall be subject to a fine of five dollars.

Sec. 3. No person shall make any excrementitious deposits or slaughter any live stock on any of the public grounds of the town under penalty of one dollar for each offence.

Ordinance 18. Every occupant of a lot in the corporate limits of the town, shall at all times keep their lots in a closely condition under a penalty of five dollars for failure so to do.

Ordinance 19. Sec. 1. No person shall indecently expose or exhibit his or her person within the limits of the town under a penalty of one dollar for the first, and for each subsequent offence five dollars.

Sec. 2. No lewd woman or woman of suspicious character shall

be on the streets of Louisville at night after 10 o'clock under a penalty of five dollars for each offence.

Ordinance 20. Sec. 1. Rolling hoops, playing at ball or any other game on the streets or any of the public squares of the town shall be prohibited under a penalty of one dollar for each and every offence.

Sec. 2. All games of whatever kind on any of the streets or public squares of the town on the Sabbath day shall be prohibited under a penalty of five dollars for each and every offence.

Sec. 3. No person shall play cards or any other game of chance on the streets or public squares of the town under penalty of ten dollars for each offence.

Ordinance 21. It shall be unlawful for persons to assemble together at any time on any of the streets of the town, so as to obstruct the same, under a penalty of one dollar.

Ordinance 22. No person shall shoot a gun, pistol or any other fire arms unnecessarily, within the limits of the town, or explode or fire off any squib, crackers, fire rockets, bean or grit shooters, or any other fireworks in town, under the penalty of ten dollars for each offence. One half of the fine to go to the informer.

Ordinance 23. Any person who shall, in the corporate limits of the town publicly use any obscene or profane language, or be guilty of any disorderly conduct, tending to violate the peace, quiet and good order of the town, shall be subject to a penalty of twenty dollars.

Ordinance 24. Every owner or lessee of any business house in town shall be responsible for any disorderly conduct upon his premises or in his house, and every owner or lessee of any business house in town who shall permit any disorderly conduct in his house or upon his premises without reporting the same on affidavit to the Mayor of the town, shall be subject to a fine of ten dollars.

Ordinance 25. No privy shall be built or placed or allowed to remain within 20 feet of any of the streets of the town under penalty of ten dollars.

Ordinance 26. It shall not be lawful for any female dog to run at large while in heat, within the corporate limits of the town, under penalty of five dollars to be paid by the owner. If the owner cannot be found it shall be the duty of the constable to kill the bitch.

Ordinance 27. All barber shops in town shall be closed from Saturday night 12 o'clock, until Sunday night 12 o'clock, and no barber shall carry on his business during that time under a penalty of five dollars.

Ordinance 28. It shall be unlawful for any persons, except Apothecaries and Practising physicians (in case of necessity) to sell or offer for sale any article whatever on the Sabbath day, except ice and milk, and articles necessary for burial purposes within the corporate limits of the town under a penalty of ten dollars for each offence.

Ordinance 29. All shops or places for the sale of spirituous, vinous or malt liquors, shall be closed on each Sabbath in the year from 12 o'clock on Saturday night to 12 o'clock on Sunday night, and no person or persons shall, during or between these times, in any licensed liquor saloon, sell or give away any spirituous, vinous or malt liquors, except in case of sickness, and then only upon a certificate of a practicing physician, and any one or more persons seen going in or out of a Bar Room between said hours shall be deemed PRIMA FACIE evidence of the guilt of the

proprietor of said Bar Room. Any person violating this ordinance shall for the first offence pay a fine of ten dollars, for the second offence a fine of twenty dollars; for the third offence have his license revoked.

Ordinance 30. Any person who interferes in any way with any of the street lamps or lamp posts in the town except those employed for the purpose, upon conviction shall pay a fine of ten dollars for each and every offence.

Ordinance 31. Any person who shall place any combustible material in a position where it could endanger the safety of the town from liability to fire shall be subject to a fine of five dollars.

Ordinance 32. When any person shall be found drunk and down upon the streets of the town, he or she shall be fined five dollars.

Ordinance 33. It shall be unlawful for any person to jump on or off the train in the corporate limits, while in motion, under a penalty of five dollars.

Ordinance 34. The town clerk shall be ex-officio sexton to the public graveyard in the town, and all internments therein shall be made by and under the supervision of the commissioners of the town. Order and regularity shall be observed in digging graves and making internments. All persons expecting to make internments therein, shall apply to the Clerk and have small lots of ground marked off and a record thereof made in the book. As a compensation to the clerk for his attention to the duties herein assigned, he shall charge fifty cents. He shall also charge fifty cents for the town and pay the same to the town treasurer, for each spot of ground assigned large enough for a grave, and he may collect the same by warrant if not voluntarily paid.

Any person making internment in said grave yard contrary to the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined five dollars to be applied to the improvement of said grave yard.

Ordinance 35. No person shall sell within the corporate limits of the town any unwholesome food. Any person violating this ordinance shall for each and every offence pay a penalty of ten dollars.

Ordinance 36. Any person who shall use any violent, abusive or insulting language, or threatening gestures toward the Constable, or any officer of the town, while in discharge of his duty, shall be subject to a fine of five dollars.

Ordinance 37. Any person or persons refusing to assist the Constable or any town officer they called upon to assist to make an arrest shall be fined ten dollars.

Ordinance 38. Any person desiring to practice any profession, business or trade, taxed by any ordinance of this town, shall, before commencing such profession, business or trade, pay the tax required and obtain a license signed by the Constable and Mayor of the town, to practice such profession, business or trade. And any person engaging in or practicing any profession, business or trade taxed by any ordinance of this town, without having first paid the tax and obtained the license shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction shall be fined fifty dollars.

Ordinance 39. There shall be an annual tax of five dollars for the privilege of carrying on the business of weighing—and any person who shall weigh any produce in the corporate limits of the town for pay or compensation and without having paid said tax, shall be fined for each offence one dollar; provided, however that the provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to the town weigher, elected by the commissioners of the town, nor to the cotton weigher, elected by the commissioners of the county; in respect to the weighing of cotton.

Ordinance 40. Any person who shall sell or offer for sale any price boxes or patent medicines of any kind within the corporate limits of the town must first obtain and pay a license of five dollars. Said license will entitle him to sell for one year from date. This shall not apply to the regularly licensed merchants of the town.

Ordinance 41. The penalties designated in the foregoing ordinances shall be recovered by the Mayor, in the name of the Commissioners of the town of Louisville.

Ordinance 42. Any person convicted of violating any one of the ordinances of the town who is not able to pay the fine and cost imposed upon him, may be confined at hard labor on the streets of the town until the fine and costs are paid.

Ordinance 43. Every person required to list property or polls in the town of Louisville, shall make out and deliver to the list-taker a statement verified by his oath of all real and personal property, money, credits, investments in bonds, stocks, joint stock companies, annuities or otherwise, and the value of improvements on real estates the same was assessed, in his possession or under his control on the 1st day of June, either as owner or holder thereof, or as parent, husband, guardian, trustee, executor, administrator, receiver, accounting officer, partner, agent, factor or otherwise. Any person failing to list his taxables during the month of June upon the same days the township list is taken shall be liable to a double tax.

Ordinance 44. All taxes for the town of Louisville (except license tax) shall be due and collectable on the first day of October in each year and every person failing to pay his taxes by the 31st of December in every year, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and be, upon conviction before the Mayor, fined double the amount of said taxes, provided, however, that said fine shall in no case exceed fifty dollars.

Ordinance 45. After conviction and judgment for the violation of any of the ordinances of the town the Mayor is authorized to remit so much of the penalty as in his judgment the circumstances may warrant.

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LICENSES:

On each exhibition, concert or lecture for profit, except the same be given exclusively for religious, charitable or educational purposes, for each performance, \$3.

On circus, for each performance, \$10.00.

On Peddlers on foot \$5 per month.

On every company of Gypsies or other persons pretending to tell fortunes \$10 per year.

On itinerant dealers in Lightning rods \$5 per year.

On itinerant dealers in stoves, ranges, clocks, \$10 per year.

On auctioneer or cryer \$2.50 per year.

On each billiard or pool table kept for public use whether in connection with or separate from any place where liquor is sold \$10 per year.

On each boxing alley, or alley of the like kind, baggattelle table, or stand or place for any other game or play, with or without a name, (unless for private amusement or exercise alone) \$5.

On liquor dealers \$100.00 per year.

On every itinerant dentist, medical practitioner, optician, portrait or miniature painter, engraver, artist and every person taking or exhibiting likenesses of the human face, \$3.
