### North Carolina and North Carolinians.

There is not a town in North Carolina that has not contributed many of its brightest young men to swell the tide of emigration that flows toward the West. But, even with the odds against us, I still believe that if most North Carolina boys who will stay at home and work as hard as they are compelled to work when they go away, will win as much reputation and make as comfortable a living as elsewhere. They may not make as much money but they will get as much out of life. There is no doubt about the fact that, while there is something of toadyism to wealth in North Carolina, there is very little in comparison to the toadying that characterizes other sections. A poor man with character and capacity stands better and higher in North Carolina than any State in the Union, and a little money will go further. It makes little difference whether a man gets \$1,000, \$2,000 or \$3,000 a year. It makes no difference about the cost of living. In North Carolina \$2,000 will give a man as many comforts as \$4,000 will in this city, and more than \$5,000 will in New York. Besides, while we have a great deal of talk in North Carolina to the effect that we are wanting in State pride, I do not believe it. North Carolinians love their State as well as any people, and none ever leave it who do not fondly cherish its good name. There is a comradeship among North Carolinians you do not find among other people. Take South Carolina for example. You will find that the people of Charleston feel an attachment for the people of their city but they do not know the people of the State at large as we do in North Carolina. We have less exclusion and more comradeship and exchange of friendship between people of all sections of the State than you will find in any other State in the Union. We have our divisions and dissensions, but they heal up and we stand together in matters outside. Sometimes we allow our jealousies to keep down ambitious men, and prejudices are not wanting among us, but I believe there is little of this as in most commonwealths. And notwithstanding the depression in the price of our staple crops, our people do not sit down and cry about it. We are building new factories and opening new enterprises. The very poverty of agriculture is driving our people into other pursuits, and never before in the history of the State was there more activity in manufacturing. With large factories of all kinds there will come a better demand for milk, butter and truck products that will open a new era to agriculture, and work a revolution in our worn-out method of devoting everything to cotton and tobacco.

### Persistent Misrepresentation.

There has been a persistent effort on the part of the leaders of the party to misrepresent the action of the Legislature in regard to the Alliance charter. The truth ought to be told. The only thing the Legislature did about the charter was to provide that any man who had put money in the business agency fund could draw it out if he desired to do so. That is all. Mr. Wm. A. Graham, Trustee of the Fund, all the Alliance officers and their attorneys in their speeches said that they were willing to this, and as a matter of fact they first suggested it to the committee that was considering the repeal of the charter. Now some of them say that they voted for or advocated this under coercion; that they were afraid if they didn't do so, the whole charter would be repealed; and that it was a wicked thing in the Legislature to permit men to draw their own money out of the fund. They had helped to make. Well, we don't believe any honest man, who saw the Legislature, did anything but vote fair, and Mr. A. Graham and every other Alliance Senator voted for the bill as it passed. Now they plead the baby argument, and try to work up sympathy for themselves because they need to raise money for "Persimmon" to keep their party from going into the wilderness. The people are not fools. They have seen the farmers and the Democrats are not to be deceived. Legislation unanimously passed a bill allowing poor farmers to take their money out of the business agency fund if they wanted to do so. That is all the Legislature did. Is that the real cause of the great lie and cry we hear? No, there are two reasons:

1. The party junta feel the need of a rallying cry. If they can make the people believe they are persecuted and ill treated, they think they can prevent their utter rout and annihilation which is sure to overtake them. They see the handwriting on the wall and like drowning men they are grabbing at straws.

2. The party men are mad because they cannot use the party on the business agency fund to propagate their false notions and continue their deception of the people.

### Alliance Democrats.

The attempt made in South Carolina and other States to proscribe Alliance Democrats from holding office is as silly as it is wrong. There are as good Democrats who have been earnest Alliance men as live in the country, and they are as much entitled to recognition as are any other Democrats. In South Carolina certain able Democrats have been to the Postoffice Department at Washington and requested the Postmaster General to pay no attention to the recommendations of Senator Irby and the members of the House, nominated and elected by Democrats, because they belonged to the Alliance. The allegation was that they were not Democrats. These Congressmen asked for a hearing, which Mr. Bissell granted, and there were present these distinguished South Carolinians who had impeached the Democracy of the Alliance-Democratic members of Congress. It was a stern hearing, filled with criminal accusations and recriminations.

Mr. Bissell was evidently worried over the struggle, and did not commit himself as to what course he would pursue as to the officers. He did say that what happened in the State prior to the nominations would not be taken into account, which was gratifying to the Irby party, as they construed it to mean that Mr. Bissell regarded them as respectable Democratic Representatives. They confidently expect he will decide in their favor, and from the attention paid their speeches believe he considered they had fully exonerated themselves from all the counts in the indictment.

We allude to this matter to say that it ought not to make any difference whether a man affiliated with the Alliance or not. That question has no place in the Democratic party. The only question as to any man is: Was he true to Democratic principles and did he support the Democratic nomination from top to bottom? If he did he is eligible, whether he voted the Alliance or voted the Democrats, whether he believes in free grants or is a strict valuer.

We hope that the dead past may lay in its death, and that all good Democrats will work together for the great battle of 1894—North Carolinian.

### How to Get Your Money Back.

While the Third party fellows are "resoluting" and kicking at the last Legislature for simply giving contributors to the Alliance Business Agency Fund an opportunity to withdraw their funds if they wish, contributors are asking how to get at their money again. It is a timely question and there's no harm in asking it. The editor was asked about the matter one day this week, and for the information of all concerned we print the following from the News and Observer given in answer to inquiries on the subject:

"We learn that the law requires that the certificates of payment shall be forwarded to the trustee, Maj. W. A. Graham, Macphelah, N. C., and if the money is not paid in sixty days, it becomes the duty of the applicant to inform the Attorney General, Hon. F. I. Osborne, Raleigh. In forwarding certificates, it would be well to prevent mistakes to preserve an accurate memorandum, and to send either by express or registered letter."

We would suggest that a number might club together and have their certificates all forwarded together. A man who can get a dollar just by writing for it will be apt to send for it. Meanwhile however if you do send for your money look out for scathing "resolutions" to be passed condemning you for taking your own hard earned money and putting it back in your pocket.

We do not know that the Gaston county sub-alliances have condemned anybody for withdrawing money from the Business Agency, but the county alliance has passed a resolution urging the sub-alliances to make good, by replacing all subscriptions so withdrawn. If this is done the Business Agency won't feel the withdrawing; but will it be done?
