There are now 500 lepers in Creta. In Spanish obituary notices the cause of death is always given.
The railways of the world carry over 40,000,000 passengers weekly.

The inhabitants of the United Kingdom post 44,000,000 letters, etc., each week.
About 850 pounds of mint are required to produce a pound of oil of peppermint.
Ninety-five thousand tons of American apples are imported into England every year.
Forty thousand pounds is spent each week in keeping England's telegraph lines in order.
The sword of Napoleon I has been placed in the museum of the Military hospital, Paris.

Rats are fond of sunflower seeds. A trap baited with these seeds seldom fails to catch the rodents.
The commercial value of South Africa as represented by its annual trade is stated to be \$25,000,000.
Microscopists say that the strongest microscopes do not, probably, reveal the lowest stages of animal life.
In some of the farming districts of China pigs are harnessed to small wagons and made to draw them.
The deepest running stream in the world is said to be the Niagara river just under the suspension bridge.
At Oban the town council has, in the interest of decorum and civilization, forbidden all bathing from the beach.

There has been of late an extraordinary increase in the number of foreign bandmen employed in the British navy.
In the United States there are 419 different species of trees, and 19 of them, when perfectly seasoned, will sink in water.
Hume published his brilliant 'Philosophical Essays,' which must have occupied his time during several years, at the age of 20.
Barcelona is the center of the manufacture of cigarette paper. Two houses alone produce 180,000 reams a year, valued at \$60,000.
Tattooing is done by pricking the letter or pattern on the arm or part to be tattooed with a needle and rubbing in gunpowder or india ink.
Chinese writers claim that the cultivation of wheat was introduced into the Celestial empire by the Emperor Shinung 2,700 years before Christ.

The finest flour is not the most nutritious, for while it contains the most starch the albuminoids and other nutritious elements are almost lacking.
The cost of raising wheat in Washington and Pennsylvania is almost exactly the same, in the former the cost being \$17.07 per acre and the latter \$17.60.
Tea wheat, a variety years ago much esteemed in this country, is said to have been grown from a single grain found in a box of tea brought from China.
The name wheat is derived from a Saxon word, 'hwæte,' signifying white, because the flour from this grain is lighter in color than that from any other.
The title of emperor is of such exalted dignity as to outrank that of royalty. An emperor is the supreme head of countries some or all of which are governed by kings.

English bishops receive from £2,500 to £10,000, and each is provided with a palace in which to reside. There are said to be considerable perquisites attaching to the office.
Starlings appear to have had an early and successful nesting season in England. On May 20 and onward large numbers of young were on the wing in various parts of Northumberland.
Companions of the noble orders take rank immediately after the knights of the same order, their precedence among themselves being arranged by a complicated but well understood system.
The telephone line between Vienna and Trieste is believed to be one of the largest European lines now in operation. It covers a distance of 506 kilometers, or rather more than 314 miles.
An English correspondent, protesting against the destruction of moles, says in the fields they are of incalculable benefit to the agriculturist, for not only do they clear the ground of worms and other pests, but they drain it.
The reason given that birds do not fall off their perch is because they cannot open the foot when the leg is bent. Look at a hen walking, and you will see it closes its toes as it raises the foot and opens them as it touches the ground.

The strength of the London police force consists of a chief commissioner, 3 assistant commissioners, 5 chief constables, 31 superintendents, 197 inspectors, 1,834 sergeants and 12,754 constables, making a grand total of 15,225 of all ranks.
Nothing is known at the Chinese embassy in London of the rumor that Li Hung Chang's coffin had been sent to London to await his arrival, and, in answer to an inquiry there, an attaché shook his head in a comprehensively doubting way.
The London Spectator looks forward to the day when the cycle will cost \$25 and will last ten years. Cycles will then become for all the healthy the universal means of locomotion and will be hired out in thousands instead of tens, for pennies an hour.
The Matabele girl is not devoid of sentiment. On the contrary, she has the greatest pride in the exploits of the man she marries. He may be old, toothless, with one leg in the grave and the other feebly tripping a war dance, but if he can show on his assegai the blood of many victims he is the greatest old beau in the kraal.

It is estimated that over 300,000 pilgrims performed their religious duties and made sacrifice at Mecca, Arabia, during the late pilgrimage. The Sultan has sent a magnificent cloak of honor to the Emir of Mecca, and a cloak embroidered with gold thread to the governor general of Hedjack. Mecca has now assumed its usual quiet aspect, all the pilgrims having left for their respective countries.

THE VALUE OF MANUFACTURERS TO SOUTHERN FARMERS.

The value to the cotton planters of the South in having cotton mills at home is twofold. These mills create a home market for the cotton, and also a home market for all of the diversified products of the farm. The Jacksonville Times Union, in making some comparisons of prices in different Southern cities, says:
The good price paid for cotton at Augusta is doubtless to a great degree due to the fact that that city is in a great cotton-manufacturing section, as well as a cotton-growing section. Probably 250,000 bales of cotton are manufactured within 100 miles of Augusta. This is fully half of the cotton that is grown in that radius. The mills in the cotton fields get their cotton for less than the New England or European mills have to pay, but it seems from the high price always paid for cotton in Augusta that the cotton-growers get a part of the amount that is saved from transportation charges by building the mills where they can get cotton direct from the growers.

These facts should be persistently impressed upon the people of the whole South. Some months ago the Manufacturers' Record published a letter showing that within a small circle around some of the large cotton mills of South Carolina the advance in the value of farms had been greater than the total capital invested in the mills. In its business life—and trade and commerce are civilization itself, for without business advancement civilization decays—the South's supreme effort should be given to the upbuilding of its manufactures. Upon the growth of manufactures in the South is staked its whole future. Its agricultural interests, its schools, its churches, its banks, its merchants, the employment of its people, must all to a great extent rest upon this one thing. Develop its industrial life, diversify and advance its manufactures, utilize its vast natural resources, and every question that now perplexes this section will be settled. Immigration of well-to-do people, and of good farmers especially from the North and west, will bring a demand for farms, prosperity will come to the entire agricultural South, the race question will no longer trouble anyone, schools will be increased, and everywhere there will be seen a happy and prosperous people.—Manufacturers' Record.

The members of the Ivy committee of Yale's class of '96 have made public what should prove a happy solution of the theft of the slip of Ivy that was so maliciously plucked from the grave of Gen. R. E. Lee on the Yale campus. It has been decided to plant another slip from General Lee's grave, and also a slip from the grave of Theodore Winthrop, the poet and writer, who was one of the first Yale officers to meet death in the Union Army. The planting of the ivies will be made a notable event, and the plan of having ex-Governor Chamberlain, of South Carolina, deliver the oration, is being considered. It is probable, however, that the slips will not be put into the ground until spring. Mr. Wells, chairman of the committee in speaking of the matter, said: "The Winthrop ivy will be placed close beside that from the grave of General Lee, and as the vines grow together, they will typify the wish of every loyal Yale man for a union in spirit of the North and South, and a blow at any attempt to create sectionalism in any form among Yale alumni and undergraduates.

EFFECT OF TIGHT GARTERS.

The garter has become a thing of beauty, but it remains a hygienic abomination, according to the doctors. This referred to the round garter—the compressor of muscles, the hindrance to the circulation and the benumber of nerves. And it is this instrument of torture upon which the manufacturers have lavished their attention until it has become so pretty an affair, with its filigree buckles and its ribbon bows, that only the most Spartan of women can resist it.
The round garter, fastened above the knee, is not considered by the physicians quite so deadly as the tightly drawn corset. There are no ribs in the leg to be compressed, and the vital organs of the body are not located in the neighborhood of the knee. But next to the injurious compression of the waist, bust and abdomen, by stays, the hygienists place the compression of the leg by elastic garters. The rubber bands which encircle the flesh just above the knee are dangerous because of their effect upon the muscles and the circulation. The veins are contracted, and the blood of necessity is retarded in its flow. The result is not merely local injury but harm to the whole system, which is effected by the sluggishness of the circulation.
But the danger does not merely lie in an impaired circulation, but is also muscular. In walking the muscles just above and just below the knee are brought into more play than any others. The compression of the muscles at this point is therefore something to be avoided, for it means additional effort at every step, and consequent weariness. Often this fatigue produces muscular rheumatism, and doctor's bills are the direct result of the frivolous bit of silk elastic, ribbons and silver which dealers call a garter.
