GOLD IN NORTH CAROLINA.
\$24,000,000 Produced in the State—
Special Report by Geological
Survey.

High News-Observer.
The geological survey report on
gold deposits in North Carolina is
now ready for distribution and
copies can be obtained from the
State geologist by forwarding 8
cents for the payment of postage.
The report is accompanied by a
geological map of the State which
shows the regions in which gold
has been found, in any considera-
ble quantity, the location of the
more important mines, and the
character of the rocks in all the
gold producing districts. The
new discoveries in Granville county
are located on this map but not
described in the report as the lat-
ter had been printed before the
discoveries were made.

The total amount of gold pro-
duced in the State to date is esti-
mated to be \$24,000,000 mostly in
Franklin, Nash, Montgomery,
Moore, Davidson, Rowan, Stanly,
Cabarrus, Mecklenburg, Union,
Burke, McDowell, Rutherford,
Henderson, Jackson and Macon
counties.

At what time gold mining was
first undertaken in North Carolina
says Prof. Holmes in this report,
cannot be ascertained, but several
traditions, which carry a large
probability of truth, would seem
to indicate that the auriferous
character of the section was known
before the Revolutionary war.

One of the localities in this State,
which it is believed was worked
before that struggle began, was
the Oliver mine in Gaston county.
Information has recently been re-
ceived of the successful operation of
the Parker mine in Cherokee coun-
ty, N. C., by the Cherokee Indians
long before the coming of the
white pioneers into that section.

They obtained only nugget gold
and their art was entirely inade-
quate to the winning of the fine
dust gold.

The first authentic find was on
the Reed plantation, in Cabarrus
county, where a 17-pound nugget
was found in 1799. Its value was
not suspected at first, but when it
was ascertained to be gold, a sys-
tematic search was undertaken
and a large number of nuggets
were unearthed.

Success at this mine stimulated
search elsewhere; nugget gold was
found at the Dunn mine in Meck-
lenburg county soon afterwards,
and curious stories are still current
of the common uses to which these
nuggets were put by the local gun-
smiths.

By 1825, gold mining on a vigor-
ous scale was carried on along
the entire Appalachian slope, from
Virginia to Alabama. The placers
or like deposits were first worked,
then the gossan outcrops of the
veins, where slight skill with few
and cheap appliances were ade-
quate to the work. The exhaus-
tion of these easily worked stores
was effected about the time of the
discovery of gold in California
and there was a large exodus of
miners to that territory. The
mining work had not recovered
from the retarding influences of
this exodus when the civil war
came and put an end to all work.

At the close of the war but one
gold mine in North Carolina was
in operation. Since then there
have been spasmodic revivals and
depressions in gold mining
throughout the State and at the
present time everything points to
a healthy growth of the industry.

The greatest drawback in the
development of this industry in
the State at the present time is
the lack of large metallurgical plants,
located at central points like Salis-
bury and Charlotte, where the
ores from the hundreds of neigh-
boring mines could be successfully
treated.

We left the Asylum Tuesday
the 13th at 12:30 P. M., for Loui-
sburg. We reached Henderson
on time. When we spoke about
stalling at Horner's Hill on account
of having on an extra box car or
two, Bro. Powell immediately
wanted to know how much we
wanted to bet on it. He informed
us that he had another engine
that could pull the extra load up
the hill. If it was not for his
kindly and courteous bearing to-
ward every body, more people
would lose their temper, but Capt.
Powell seems so anxious to get to
Henderson on time that when he
fails, we feel as sorry for him as
we are mad about being left.

After a good dinner at Massen-
burg's hotel, which is always
hugely enjoyed, we boarded the
S. A. L. train for Franklinton
where we change cars for Loui-
sburg. On all the roads of this
system we have never found a
cross grained, early ungentleman-
ly conductor. It seems to give
them pleasure to accommodate and
serve their patrons, even the col-
ored porters seem delighted to
render any one a service. We
have marked this characteristic
of the S. A. L. system with great
pleasure. Politeness and courtesy
always tell whether by corpora-
tions or individuals.

We arrived at Louisburg about
half past four in the afternoon
and were gratefully surprised to
find Bros. Baker, Barrow and
Meadows at the depot to meet us.
When we reached the Meadows
House Bro. M. S. Davis, whose
good wife is our kinswoman, was
waiting and claimed us for his
guest. Bro. Davis has charge of
the Louisburg Female College.
He is an old hand at the business
—has been a school man for many
years. The first girl we met was
little Annie Strickland whom we
sent to the College in 1894 at the
earnest request of Bro. Green who
was president at that time. She
is being educated by the benevo-
lent owner of the College, Mr.
Washington Duke. She has a fine
voice which is being trained and
cultivated. When quite a little
child she was in the choir of the
Oxford Orphan Asylum and
wherever she sung always was
the wonder and admiration of
those who heard her. We want
her to make a splendid woman.

At night we visited the Lodge,
Royal No. 413. The brethren
were cordial and our visit exceed-
ingly pleasant. We never saw the
E. A. Degree conferred better.
The brethren one and all seemed
to be impressed with the great
teachings of the beautiful cere-
mony. The W. M. Bro. Hart
presided with ease and conferred
the degree very impressively.
Bro. Yarbrough, although a very
young Mason, did the work of
Senior Deacon as well as we ever
saw it. There was a vigor and
enthusiasm about the work and
the brethren that was exceedingly
gratifying. Their Lodge room is
a gem, though small it is tastily
and comfortably furnished, and
you feel when you take your seat
in the comfortable chairs that it is
a real pleasure to sit in such a
Lodge, because it betokens interest,
thoughtfulness and taste.

No wonder the best men in the
town are knocking at their door
for admission. This is always
the case under like circumstances.
When a man lives up to his high
calling and his Lodge room shows
the signs of his appreciation and
culture; men are attracted to its
grand teachings and want to en-
ter its portals.

The brethren called on us to say
something about the asylum and
kindly listened to the few words
we had to say.

We left them the next day feel-
ing glad of our visit and nearer to
those brethren. May the Supreme
Grand Master make them the ob-
jects of His care and blessings and
enable them to practice the great
principles of Masonry, friendship,
morality and brotherly love.
