(consumption) abounded among
the fine cattle in parts of the State.
The Messenger having some

serious disease among milk cows,
thus endangering the health of
milk drinkers, sought to induce
the late blundering and ignorant
legislature to make provision for
cattle examination in North Car-
olina by a veterinary expert. But

Everybody is busy with exami-
nations, and preparations for Com-
mencement. This week ends the
most prosperous session in the history
of the College. Next week
we have the joyous festivities of
Commencement. Monday night,
24th, Hon. Walter Clark, the most
universally popular man in public
life in North Carolina will address
the Law Department. Visitors
should make a note of this and be
here at that time. On Tuesday the
Trustees met, and on Tuesday
night Dr. L. G. Broughton, of
Roanoke, Va., a young son of the
Old North State, who has made
much reputation and is doing
much good will address the Alumi-
ni. Wednesday morning the ad-

**CHANGES IN THE SCHOOL
LAW.**
SUPERINTENDENT MEBANE'S AP-
PEAL.

The Township is now the Unit in the
State's Public School System—Let
the Weak County Schools Be Com-
bined into One Strong School—The
Great Importance of the August Elec-
tion for Local Taxation to Supple-
ment the School Fund.

TO THE FRIENDS OF PUBLIC EDUCATION:
I wish to explain one or two im-
portant changes in the school law
as enacted by the last General As-
sembly of North Carolina.

First: The township is to be the
unit of our public school system.
The public schools in the township
are under the control and man-
agement of the five school commit-
teemen. These men have large
discretion as to establishing schools
in their townships. As a matter
of fact, under the old law in many
instances there are three butts, not
school houses, each receiving
\$75 per year. Under the new law
it is possible to have, instead of
the three cabins, one good school
house near the center of the terri-
tory covered by the three cabins
and have \$225 for this school. In-
stead of having three \$15 teachers
we may have one \$50 man or wo-
man that may do more for the
school children in four months
than under the old system was
done in two or three years. Who
would not rather send his children
two or even three miles to a school
that is a school than to have a poor
school on the corner of his farm?
I am aware that some are very
much opposed to the township sys-
tem on account of school houses
being near them, and on account
of work or money spent on some
of these houses. I hope those per-
sons will take a liberal view of
this matter, lay aside personal
preference and join in hearty co-
operation for the greatest good to
the greatest number. When we
unite the small schools into one
good, strong school, with one en-
ergetic, live teacher, then and not
until then may we expect to have
public schools of such force and
character that will be felt in our
State.

Second: The election to be held
on "Tuesday after the second Mon-
day in August" is worthy of your
careful consideration. This elec-
tion is to be held in every town-
ship. The county commissioners
at their June meeting are to give
notice of this election in every
county in North Carolina. Any
township that votes to tax itself
\$500 for public schools will re-
ceive \$500 from the State Board of
Education; or if this amount is
raised by private subscription for
a township the same amount may
be received from the State Board
of Education. Friends, do not
become alarmed when you hear
the word tax. I am sure that our
country people do have a hard time
to pay their taxes, but consider
how little would be the tax of each
one in a township in order to raise
\$1,500 and then have this supple-
mented by the State with \$500,
making \$2,000, in addition to
what school fund you now have.
Suppose where we now have 12
schools in a township we make
only eight strong schools, each one
would receive from the \$2,000
\$250; add this \$250 to your school
fund. If we can put three of the
\$75 schools together, then we would
have \$225 plus \$225, which is \$475
for each school. Now, my friends,
do not say that all this looks very
well on paper, but it cannot be
done in our State. I tell you it
can be done, and when we have
\$475 for each of our public schools
in our State, then we will have
a right to demand professional teach-
ers in our public schools. What
right have we to talk about pro-
fessional teachers in our public
schools with only \$75 or \$100 a
year to pay such teachers?

Third: I would like to remove,
if possible, the idea that some of
our people have in regard to teach-
ers salaries. I have heard school
committees compare the salary
of a school teacher with that of the

wood-chopper, the ditcher and the
ordinary laborer. I have naught
to say against any man who does
this kind of work. It is honorable
and right, but what I want to call
your attention to is that a man's
education is his investment. Let
us see what an ordinary education
costs. In time it costs six years;
two years preparatory, and four
years in college. We will say the
cost of the preparatory education
is \$300; or college four years at
\$250 each, making a cost of \$1,300.
The six years time spent in school
would be worth at least \$600. Thus
we see that the total cost of an or-
dinary education in time and money
is about \$1,900. These figures
mean strict economy on the part
of the student. The interest on this
education is three cents per day at
6 per cent. interest. Now what
farmer or what business man would
invest \$1,900 and compare his in-
come with the 25-cent wood chop-
per or the ordinary laborer, who
has invested neither time nor
money?
