> Cheese Cake That len't Cake. Whoever invented that peculia ish called cheese cake and named it cake made a mistake, for it belongs in the list of pies as surely as does custard pie. Not every one likes cheese cake, but those who do are usually very fond of it. It is not made from sour milk, as is usually supposed, but from milk and egg cooked together so long as to produce a curd. Put two cupfuls milk in a saucepan and set it on to boil. Beat four eggs until quite light and stir them into the milk, allowing a thick curd to form. Remove from the fire and set aside to cool. Cream one-half pound of butter with one-half pound of sugar. When the curdled milk and egg are cool, mash and mix with four the butter and sugar and three well beaten eggs. Flavor with two teaspoonfuls each of brandy and sherry and one teaspoonful of cinname though they may be omitted. Pour into pie plates that have been lined with puff paste and bake quickly.—
