It will no doubt be interesting to many of the readers of the TIMES to see the roll of the pupils of the Louisburg Female Seminary (College since 1857,) as it was called every morning in the chapel during the Spring session of the year 1818, just 84 years ago. Many of the present generation will recognize on the roll the names of their grand-mothers and great-grand-mothers. We give the roll for 1818 be cause it contains the names of ladies whose ancestors or descendants figured prominently in the history of North Carolina and other sta'es. At that time the Institution was presided over by Fitch Wheeler and Miss Ann Benedict, both from Connecticut, the former a graduate of Yale.
