GOVERNOR AYCOCK ON COMPUL-SORY EDUCATION.

C. H. Mebane, Ex-Superintendent of School in Catawba College News

We have great respect for and conh dence in the wisdom of our Governor in regard to many public policies, bu we do not agree with him on the ques tion of getting the children into the public school,

We fear that public sentiment for education will have thousands of ignorant, indifferent parents in North Carolina as President Roosevelt's pub. licity will have upon the trusts of the United States. Moreover while we are in the bus

ness of making public sentiment for education (which we contend will nev. er touch thousands of parents), thous ands of white boys and girls are growing into manhood and womanhood, not only to be deprived of certain rights of citizenship, but also to de burdened so long as life shall last with all that ignorance and vice brings to those who are bound down by them. Lives too that are precious and have in them possibilities that would make jewels to adorn this dear State of ours which is so blotched with ignorance.

Pray what is to become of these children who are growing into manhood and womanhood while we are making public sentiment for educaf doit

We do not fall out with our Gover nor or any one else upon this great question. Right in the town of Newton is

public school within sight of Catawba College which numbers more than 200 children, and less than 40 of these were in the school before Christmas.

The children are not in the college, are not in the private schools, except a small part of them. Where are they? They are loafing, some of them, and some are in the mills.

POLL TAX UNLY.

The Raleigh Post falls into an error in discussing the tax provision of the recent suffrage amendment to the Constitution. It says:

"As all citizens know, or ought to know, no person can vote in this State after the first day of May next who has failed to pay his taxes, poll tax included, for the year preceding the first of May prior to the election.

* As the law distinctly mentions he poll with other taxes, it is better if bot actually necessary to avoid troubles that the receipt shall show that all taxes property AND poll, have been paid, and were paid on or before the first of May."

We presume that most people pay heir property and poll tax at the same ime and it is distrable that all be paid on or before the 1st day of May, but there is nothing in the Suffrage Article of the Constitution making the right to vote dependent upon the payment of property tax on or before the first day of May, or at any other time. Only the payment of POLL tax is required within the time mentioned, as reference to Sec. 4, Article 6, of the Con stitution will show. Therein it is stat-

"And before he shall be entitled to vote, he shall have paid on or before the first day of May of the year in which he proposes to vote, his poll tax for the previous year," etc.

Again, in the same section, in refer ence to the voting of those upon the permanent registration, we find these

"Provided, such person shall have paid his POLL tax as above requir-

The election law, framed after the adoption of the amendment, provides that no person shall be entitled to vote unless he shall have paid his POLL tax, and says nothing about tax .- Winston Sentinel.
