Some time ago certain eminent citizens of Marion, Plymouth county, Mass., tarred and feathered a visiting brother who was too assiduous in his attentions to a married woman of that town They rode him on a rail. All these things were done in the most approved style of the White Cappers of Indiana. A great uproar ensued. 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
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
