I have seen no reference to the anti-third term resolution adopted by the house of representatives on Dec. 15, 1875 (first session, Forty-fourth congress). That resolution, submitted by Mr. Sprin-ger of Illinois and adopted by the over-whelming vote of yeas 221, nays 18 and not "Resolved, That in the open

house the precedent established by Washington and other presidents of the United States in retiring from the presidential office after their second term has become, by universal concurrence, a part of our republican system of government and that any departure from this time honored custom would be unwise, unpatriotic and fraught with peril to our free institu-

tions."

The affirmative was composed of 22 Democrats and 61 Republicans, while the negative vote was entirely Republican, mostly southern, but eight northern Republicans—Bradley and Hubbell of Michigan, McDougall of New York, Denison of Vermont, Page of California, Plaisted of Maine, Pratt of Iowa and Whiting of Illinois—voting nay.
