Eight young med selected by Mr. Tawney for appointment to the Military academy at West Point or the Military academy at Annapolis have been Naval academy at Annapolis have been rejected in succession on account of their inability to pass the required examinainability to pass the required stamma-tion in elementary English branches. Mr. Tawney calls attention to the fact that each of his appointess was a graduate of a Minnesota figh school and selected largely upon his high standing as a stu-dent. As the Minnesota schools read-very high Mr. Tawney is apparently jus-tified in that the criticism he makes of the public school system must have sem-eral amplication and not he confined to

Minnesota nor to the district from which Mr. Tawney believes that the fault is with the modern system of cramming children and rushing them through the grade schools without proper attention He calls attention to the fact that hundreds and thousands of children in his state are entering the high schools at the age of fourteen years or under, and he does not believe it possible that these youths have been prosrip prepared for the heavier work of the high schools.

The criticism made by Mr. Tawney has been urred by many of the abliest adds. been urged by many of the ablest educators of the country for several yours, apparently without any appreciable effect. No one will contend but that remarkable and destrable progress has been made in educational methods within the last generation. Those requirements are not exacting yet the fact remains that many high school graduates fall to meet them and that a large number of drilleries throughout the country are prospering by coaching applicants for the military and naval academies in studies which they should have mastered in the which they should have mastered in the public schools. The question is one which should command the attention of officials charged with the conduct and management of the public schools of the

Now, there is little consolation in that. The only count of comfort is the fact that my district is not alone in the unpreparedness of its boys. Upon inquiry at Amnapolis I was given the following figures: Out of 73 only 37 passed at two examinations, and 150 out of a total of 400 examined. About 25 per cent of those who failed on first examination passed on second. These figures show that the vice of our latter day educational system is a lack of thoroughness. It is spread out too much. The curriculum is too extensive. Better to know a few things well than to have a smattering of all things. Experts are the persons who climb high and who receive big wages. "Thorough" should be the motte of our educators
