Will Parker, who aspires to the presidency in 1908 and who was President Roosevelt's chief lieutenant in thumping the pride of Uncle Mark recently and in driving him out of the presidential race, affords no support to Cox, old boy, and will make any concession demanded by that treacherous boss rather than incur his enmity, for strange as it may seem, Cox can overthrow the Repubican party in Ohio whenever its wants.
