I was up in Iowa recently on a lecture tour and while among the Hawkeyes I talked with all serts and conditions of men, without regard to political affiliations, in order to form if possible a correct idea and opinion as to how things political in that state are drifting. Folks out in Iowa do not seem to somehow else the impression has been created generally that the Democrats have been constantly losing in numbers at each succeeding election since 1892. This is not true. Last year the Democrats gained on the previous vote by 15 per cent, which was doing fairly well. It was not a landslide, but it was healthy growth. Last year also they won something over 100 county offices formerly held by Republicans—a performance not to be sneezed at-one which is a substantial evidence of growth. They also elected one congressman-a thing they had not done since 1892. If they could in any way secure a fair apportionment they could easily elect two or three congressmen and stand a fine show of electing a legislature to elect a senator of the United

This year the most conservative Demscrats of lowa confidently calculate to reverse the Republican majority, at least to such an extent as to render the state doubtful and to gobble another hundred county offices now held by the Republicans, while the more sanguine Democrats hope to carry the state this fall. They have nominated what they say is a strong ticket, and Hon. Jerry Sullivan, their nominee for governor, who is rated as a tiptop stumper, has promised to deliver at least one speech in each of the ninety-nine counties of the state-a big job. If Hon. Jere does that he is liable to duplicate the Horace Boles performance and to end the Commins and anti-Cummins feud in the Republican party by retiring Geverapr Cummins to private life. A New American Menace. Burope appears to be growing nervous as to what we are up to. We seem to be growing too fast to suit eastern statesmen and savants, but we will not stop growing for that reason. We must grow. We can't help it. It's the law of nature. Growth is life. Stagnation is death. Our esteemed contemporary, the St. Louis Globe-Democrat, which talks nonsense in politics,

but is otherwise sane, says: Professor Julius Wolf of the University of Breslau in an address to the Austrian Agricultural society and the Central As-sociation of Manufacturers at Vienna told his hearers about a new peril from the Americans to which they were axposed. In referring to the schemes of a union of the continental European powers against England and the United States he said that this was impracticable and also needless. Europe has nothing to fear from the industries of land, he said. It has much to fear from those of the United States, but hostlie commercial combinations on the part of Europe would not avail. The whole of Europe, he declared, could not "success fully compete with the United States save by force of arms," and he added that "by shutting off exports of cotton the United States could paralyze European industries."
