As much as any speaker ever elected he has a free hand in making up his committees. The unanimity with which he was chosen was a splendid tribute to him, considering the fact that he had cut such a wide swath in the house, participating actively inmost of the bitter controversies of the body, and in his capacity as chairman of the committee on appropriations antagonizing so many members by killing

their pet measures. He possesses much of l'esprit de corps, and many members hope that he will make the restoration of the house to its ancient place of honor in the legislative system a special feature of his administration. It is a notorious fact, very much deplored by all thinking persons, that for years the senate has been usurping all legislative powers. Against this Mr. Speaker Cannon made many a gallant fight on the floor of the house. From his greater coign of vantage he can wage the battle with more success.
