Why should Colonel Roosevelt, Judge Parker or any other citizen be abused and maligned simply because he happens to be nominated for a public office? Judge Parker did himself much credit in writing the foregoing letter, and the country would be better off-far better-if all candidates and their supporters would act in the same spirit.

The Boston Ox Gored. My esteemed personal friend, Governor Leslie M. Shaw, now secretary of the treasury and prospective candidate for the Republican presidential nemination in 1908, is one of the most eminent Republicans in the land. We violate no confidence when we say that Secretary Shaw's term in the cabine is not for long after the election is over He will stay in this year and make speeches in the west (although it would be wiser in Cortelyou to keep him from making any more such speeches as that with which Shaw dealt with the prices of "necessaries" at the beginning of the campaign—when he made light of the advance in the prices of food because some metal products had lately fallen in price) but business men in Boston have beer assured that Shaw will not bother them very much longer.

His order to have duties assessed or pickled sheepskins was an unnecessary interference with the principal business of New England and probably will benefit no large industry of the country unless it be the Chicago packers' trust. More than this, it was stupid enough to make

this order, as Secretary Shaw does, just at the beginning of the campaign. If his idea had been to hurt President Roose veit's chances one could easily enough understand the secretary's haste. But it is fair to credit him with some loyalty to the president, considering how long Colo-nel Rossevelt has stood by him when prominent interests of this section wanted the president to get rid of him.

There is an anecdote in the back of Webster's old blue backed spelling book, with which the Advertiser is no doubt familiar, as it is the most valuable of all New England products, to the effect that very much depends on whose ox is gored. The foregoing editorial from the Advertiser is another proof of the truth of that ancient story Its ox is "the pickled sheepskin." loesn't want a high tariff levied on that useful article of manufacture, but there's no sense in abusing Secretary Shaw. The annexation of the Islands to the United States has not been a commercial success so far as the islands are concerned. Since we have been United States territory we have not made great prog-ress. One reason for this is because the laws by which we are governed are not suited to the country. For instance, we have to obey the United States land laws and cannot rent government land for period of for more than five years at time. As it takes from two to four years to raise a crop in our climate, we can-not find anybody that will rent land for such a short period as five years. Thus we are deprived of a big income from

Since we have been annexed congress has never dredged our harbor. It is filling up and thus prevents the landing of the largest vessels. As a result of this our traffic is falling off. We have dredged the harbor at our own expense since we have been annexed, but unless it is dredged again we will lose much of our Annexation has cut off all our inter-

national revenue. On the other hand, from Uncle Sam's point of view, annexation has been a decided success. Over \$6,250,000 has been paid into the United whole cost of annexation was only \$4,000.
