THE KAISER HELPS.

HIS MAJESTY'S HEALTH MAY HERE-AFTER BE DRUNK IN WATER.

a Announcement Which May Seem to Americans of Little Importance of Temperance In Germany.

ment that the German emperor has

permitted his army officers to drink toasts in water doubtless seemed of trivial importance to most American readers. Yet it is certain to have created a sensation in Germany, where the officer who wished to be a total abstainer has found it practically impossible to live up to his principles. To drink the health of his majesty in anything else than champagne has hitherto been regarded as a mild form of leze majesty. Only a few officers have had the courage, the character and the position to face the criticism certain to follow an avowal of abstinence from alcoholic beverages. One of these is Field Marshal Count von Haeseler, recently retired, who was considered one of the most brilliant officers in the service. He is, moreover, a warm friend of the emperor, and his example may well have influenced his sovereign when the latter informed the Munich Society Against the Misuse of Spirituous Liquors that "no compulsion exists to partake of toasts in alcoholic drink" and expressed the hope that

this fact should receive wide publicity. It would be a mistake for any one to portray the officers of the kaiser's army as merely an aggregation of topers. Not even the sensational writers, like Beyerlein, Bilse and Von Bandissin, have gone so far as this, but all of them have dwelt upon the fact that there was entirely too much drinking, and drinking to excess, particularly in the officers' casinos or clubs, and there has been a widespread belief that this evil, instead of decreasing, has grown worse, particularly in isolated garrisons and in the most fashionable and aristocratic regiments of the service. Everywhere the temptations besetting a young officer are very great. He is expected to drink with every comrade at the first entertainment in which he participates and is supposed to lag behind no one in conviviality at the regim tal gathering known as the liebesmahl, or regimental "feast of brotherhood" which has been the undoing of many

That there could be a temperance or a moderation solciety of which the emperor would take notice would have seemed impossible twenty years ago. Still more incredible would have appeared a prophecy that within so short time there would be a widespread agitation to curtail the use of beer and liquor. There were then voices crying in the wilderness, but the wildernes was very great, the voices few and the

echoes very rare. Curiously enough, it is the scientists who have led in the movement rather than social reformers, and it was in Heldelberg itself, the home of the beer drinking student, famous for its giant tun, that the experiments of Professor Kraepelin, begun in 1892, supplied a variety of scientific arguments in favor of abstinence as opposed to moderate drinking. Professor Kraepelin and his assistants speedily became convinced that there was no increase in vigor and alertness through drinking. In the case of some typesetters it was "ascertained that when these men had drunk half a bottle of wine each they were under the delusion of increased vigor and capacity for work, while they actually did inferior work. This disturbing influence was still quite distinct on the following day, so that a second day of abstinence was necessary to bring the men up again to their

own standard of efficiency." Among the students, particularly among those studying medicine, there are flourishing abstinence societies which make the oldest inhabitants of Heidelberg rub their eyes in amaze-

Manufacturers, too, are beginning to see by practical experience that workmen who are constantly steeped in alcobol lose in their productive power. The difference between the laborers in north and south Germany in this respect is noteworthy. The publisher of prominent Munich newspaper who recently moved there from Berlin estimates that the difference is fully 25 per cent in favor of the north Germans. His new workmen have their beer bottles by their side throughout the day and have blocked every effort to prevent drinking during office hours. This mployer calls the great beer breweries which have made Munich prosper-

ous "the curse of south Germany." Those students of our own liquor problem who see in the habitual use of beer and light wines an antidote to whisky and brandy drinking evidently have something to learn from a study of conditions in Germany. They may be surprised to find an increasing number of societies working for temperance, particularly in Bremen and Hamburg. where the Good Templars have obtained a firm foothold. Moreover, the German movement has at last obtained a respectful hearing from the press, which will be all the more liberal minded now that the emperor has taken his stand in regard to temperance in the army.-New York Evening Post.

ACTION OF ALCOHOL

WHY AND HOW IT MAKES A MAN INTOXICATED.

Scientific Explanation of a Much

"This effect is slightly irritant in character, the degree of irritation de pending on the proportion of alcohol present. The more alcohol the greater

swiftly through the veins; the nerve centers and nerve fibers feel the stimu-lation, and the supply of blood to the brain is increased, thus stimulating thought, action and emotion.

"It is in this stage that men feel that glow of good fellowship which leads them to declare their love and admiration first for themselves and their own achievements and then for their fel-

"During this preliminary stage, when the system is under the stimulation referred to, there is a general sense of what the French so aptly term blen alse,' but for which the best equivalent we have is the phrase 'well being.' Not only are the physical centers uplifted, but often the moral ones as well. It is no uncommon thing to hear a man in his cups bewall his failures and firmly avow his determination to do better This is due not so much to any person al equation on the part of the subject as to the decided stimulation of the brain, particularly those portions in which the centers of thought and emotion are seated. This stimulation is, of course, but temporary, though it may be prolonged for a short period by repe-

tition of the dose. "After passing through the digestive organs the alcohol enters the blood unchanged. Here, meeting with the alkalinity of the blood, the alcohol becomes acid and sets free the active principle of intoxication, which has been termed 'furfurol.' In intoxication we have to ical first with ethylic alcohol, of w fusel oil has long been considered the most active element. Recent investigations have proved that it is a heretofore inknown element of this fusel oil which causes all the trouble. By a process of elimination this element has peen separated and so recognised and named furfurol. It has also been found that this element is not separated or set free from the alcohol until it ascounters a certain element in the blood for which it has an affinity. Therefore, while the alcohol is passing through the digestive organs, not having yet been passed on info the blood, and thence into the general circulation, it is only the pleasant features of a mild systemic stimulation which are experi-

"Once the alcohol has passed into the circulation, however, the trouble begins. Under the stimulation already referred to the heart muscles have been working harder, the veins and arteries have expanded to accommodate the increased flow of blood, the brain and nerve centers have become more active by the stimulation being artificial and coming from without rather than from within; these organs. once the momentary stimulus fails, begin to flag, and all the effect is lost. It is just so that an engine making an unusual spurt of speed under extra pressure of steam slows down and finally stops when steam is withdrawn. "It seems paradoxical that furfurel constituent of alcohol, should act the very opposite of alcohol. Prior to its entrance into the circulation we have een that the effects on the body are pleasant when taken in small quantities. When a large amount is taken it of course passes proportionately quick-er into the blood, and its evil effects are more apparent. Being of a highly irritating character, it sets up a state of inflammation, more or less acute, in all the tissues with which it comes in contact. Passing through the veine and arteries, already expanded by stimulation, its irritating qualities cause them to contract, and so circula tion is impeded. The delicate sheaths of the nerves also feel it and convey

the sense of irritation to the brain where it is impressed and recorded. This, then, is what brings about the Co's. irritable and quarrelsome stage of drunkenness. "In subjects long accustomed to alcohol, of course, this element in time loses some of its power, and larger and still larger doses are taken in order to obtain the accustomed effect. The body issues, having felt the irritation, strive to adapt themselves to it; but with very poor results. Should still more furfurol enter the system the irritation is increased to such an extent that the nerves are no longer capable of record-ing it. The poison—for it is an active poison-passes on through the circulation, benumbing every organ and every tissue it touches, until the victim falls into a state of stupor."

Ask some of the teachers in the schools and they will tell you that some who were their brightest boys are growing dull and staped, listless and indifferent, losing their oral senses, lying to cover their habit of smoking, and even so dominated by it as to ask leave of absence from the room long enough to satisfy the cravings for its in

Now, whatever may be brought forward by adults in favor of the use of tobacco, there are very few fathers who would advise their young sons to begin the habit. It seems to have such a drawing effect-mentally and physically—that the victim who begins to smoke the eigarette before he reaches years of adolescence, wishing to be manly and copy his elders, finds himself like the boy on our street. When a lady remonstrated, he said "I can't help it. I began when I was seven years old, and now I can't leave it off." What will be the future of such a boy? Will he try railroad work? The Panhandle system, the Michigan City division, the Kansas City and Fort Scott and Memphis, the South Carolina division, the Union Pacific, the Rock Island, the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy have all issued orders against the employment of cigarette smokers, because, they say, "it is harmful and renders men unfit for service requiring steady nerves." Chief Moore, of the weather depart ment in Washington, says: "A eigarette smoker is not a fit man to be trusted with the important work of this bureau."

The instances adduced have reference to the physical side of the question. What of its effect upon the moral nature of the boy?

J. J. Stone superintendent of the John Worthy Reform School in Chieago, says that 60 per cent. of the boys committed to that institution were cigarette smokers.

Of the state reformatory in Pontiac, Ill., Hon. George Torrance says, in an address in Cincinnatti: "The cigarette is making more criminals of boys than the saloon. Of nearly 1.-500 inmates, 85 per cent. were cigarette fiends."
