A SAILOR'S SERMON.

WHAT VICE ADMIRAL LORD CHARLES BERESFORD THINKS ABOUT DRINK.

His Reasons For Being a Tectotaler. The Demoralizing Effects of the perance Teaching In Schools.

Lord Charles Beresford, commander in chief of the British Mediterranean squadron, gave the most unequivocal personal testimeny to the benefits of abstinence in a speech recently delivered at Gibraltar. He has been a popular hero since his explost at Alexandria in 1882, when with a little gundria boat he engaged one of the largest Egyptian forts. He was formerly commander of the channel squadron, and it was the fleet under his command which was recently sent by the British government to pursue the Russian admiral Rojestvensky during the crisis which arose after the slaughter of British fishermen by the Baltic fleet. "When I was a young man," he said, "I was an athlete. In those days men were not treated with that reason and common sense with which they are now treated; they were allowed ashore once in three months, and consequently had a big pay day. I like to judge others by myself, and I think had I been placed in that position, having those high spirits which are born in Irishmen, would have added other spirits, and have often been found in the condition which was the custom and the fashion of that day. Now the men are treated with reason and sympathy, and they are allowed to go ashore whenever possible: the result is a tremendou and marked decrease in intoxication. In the fleet which I have the honor to command I let men go ashore on every possible occasion, and the privilege has been well repaid, as the leave breaking has been reduced almost to nil. The governor and the civil authorities inform me that they hardly ever see a man intoxicated in the streets, and the mprovement is most satisfactory."

Lord Charles added: "I do not believe that the real practical plan for creating temperance among our people has yet been tried. I believe that we shall never really get that temperance which we wish for until we have systematic scientific training in our elementary schools. Teach all our children, boys and girls, at the schools that healthy bodies make healthy minds and that health is the first important necessity for success for cheery, chivalrous, manly disposi tions, for taking with a smile the 'downs' as well as the 'ups' of life. Health is the first necessity for success in every department of life. > If occasion demands ice cream when no milk or cream is obtainable. the favorite American dainty may still be had by letting butter and water take the place of the usual ingredients. Wash a large tablespoonful of hard butter free from salt. Cream together the yolks of three eggs and one cupful of sugar, add the butter and two cupfuls of water and scald the mixture in a louble boiler. When it is near the boiling point, remove from the fire and cool. Then add the whites of the eggs, two teaspoonfuls of lemon juice and the grated peel of half a emon and freeze.

Here is a way to make ginger beer: Granulated sugar, five pounds; lemon juice, one tescupful; honey, one-fourth pound; bruised ginger root, five ounces; water, five gal-lons. Boil the ginger root half an hour in a gallon of water, add the other ingredients and strain; when cold add the well beaten white of an egg and a teaspoonful of winter-green or lemon essence; stir thoroughly and let stand four days withbeing disturbed. Bottle and keep in a cool place. This will keep for months longer than if yeast were used.

Coffee Frappe. Whipped cream on glasses of cof-fee frappe is a delightful afternoon refreshment. Mix four heaping tablespoonfuls of fine ground cof-fee with a quart of boiling water and a half cupful of sugar. Cover and let the mixture stand on an asbestus mat on the side of the stove for fifteen minutes. Strain and cool. Then add the stiffly beaten white of an egg and freeze.

To make plum jelly take helf a gallon of half ripe plums, put in a orcelain kettle; cover with water and let boil ten minutes. Pour off the juice and strain through a jelly bag. Add one pound of white sugar to each pint of juice and boil until it will harden when cold. This will require from twenty to thirty min-
