In either case there is a confessed silure to secure satisfactory results for the commissioners on both sides. phose election was either due to raiload influence, or through politics. were handicapped to secure actual good effects, because on whichever side they might be, their judgments were prejudiced and affected by exterior causes, which could not but make this discharge of their officia luties biased and partial, instead of being clear and without leanings to-

vards either side. Fixing of rates for transportation weil known through Supreme Court decisions to be a legislative act, and while the courts in some thority may be delegated to an administrative body, yet the reason-ableness of this decision, in relegat ing such a power, that the regulation of railroad rates be given to Corporation Commission of State, can be seriously questioned.

So far as instances are known, where a State Commission has exercised this power, the results are not seen to be satisfactory, Texas, Georgis and Iowa, in their experiences prove that instead of benefits, it has een otherwise.

Where is the safe and just round, that shall secure both equity to the railroad, and give the people rates which shall enable them to do ousiness, placing all who do business with railroads upon a non-competitive basis, without favored rebate or special discriminations? This is the ple, but a joint working together that shall benefit both.-Newberne Journal.

The Scottish Chief states that cotton is coming in at a rapid if you are offered rate ; that there were nearly one hunhad refused to sell last spring for six and seven cents a pound, and for tor it. which they are now getting over ten

The fact that the farmers were able to hold back so much cotton shows conclusively that they are, as a class in better financial condition than they have been for a long time. This is the first year in many that they have been able to extend the cotton market through the entire year. Heretofore the pressing demands of landlords and creditors have forced them to put their cotton on the market as fast as they could have it picked and ginned. They were at the mercy of the men to whom they owed money as rent or for supplies. The past year many of them became independent of these creditors. If they will be judicious and economical for the next year or so they will become still more independent and will soon be able to make the receipts of one crop pay the expenses of raising the next instead of, as in the past, mortgaging the entire crop before it is planted and feeling at the end of the year that they have been fortunate if they, have made enough to satisfy the demands of landlords and furnishers of supplies, and can start the next crop without carrying over debt from the last year and making it an additional lien on the crop to be raised.
