

**WOMEN AND THE HOME.**

Bread keeps better in a wooden box than in one of tin.

A leak can be temporarily stopped with a mixture of yellow soap, whitening and a very little water.

The resistance of glass jars that refuse to open can be overcome by setting them top downward in an inch or two of hot water.

Cauliflower should be turned head downwards in cooking, so that any scum may not by any chance, settle upon the white portions.

A tin cup filled with good vinegar and placed on the back of the stove is an excellent means to prevent the smell of cooking getting over the house.

In preparing a bed for an invalid, have two sets of bedclothing, so that one set may be aired while the other is in use. Wool blankets are preferable to cotton ones.

To clean plaster of parish ornaments cover them with a thick coating of starch dissolved in little water and allow this to become dry. Then it may be brushed off and the dirt with it.

A few drops of oil of sandalwood, sold by druggists, dropped on a hot shovel, will be found to diffuse a most agreeable, balsamic perfume in sick rooms or confined rooms that have not been well aired.

To stop bleeding of the nose, cut some blotting or letter paper into a piece an inch square, roll it up about the size of a lead pencil and put into the nostril. The blood will soon coagulate and cease to flow.

The picnicker and light house-keeper can buy condensed coffee by the case, ready with cream and sugar, which only needs the addition of a cup of boiling water to make a delicious cup of coffee at a very moderate cost.

A brilliant polish may be given to brass door fixtures, ornaments, etc., by washing them in a mixture of alum dye. Make a solution by boiling an ounce of alum in a pint of lye and wash the articles in it while it is still warm.

To clean a Shetland wool shawl, make a lather of lukewarm soap-suds and dip the shawl into it, rubbing and squeezing gently with the hands. Even the rinsing water should be softened with a little soap and particularly is it essential that the water, whenever it is changed, should be exactly of the same temperature as the water previously used. If this is not carefully observed, the wool is almost sure to shrink.
