RAN AWAY WITH ANOTHER MAN'S WIFE.

The following clipping is taken from the Durham correspondent to the News-Observer under date of June 28th.

"Chief of Police J. E. Winston, of Youngville, Franklin county, arrested Walter Oakley here this morning on complaint of William Lambert upon the charge of having ran away with his wife. Police

Winston was accompanied here by Mrs. Lamberts husband who took her and the children home, while the officer took Oakley, the prisoner.

The woman, with two children, one of which is but eight weeks old, has spent the day with the officers, who have been trying to reconcile her and her husband, who has exhibited the best of temper in the light of his troubles. The conduct of the wife is strange if it is not unprecedented and frequent. Oakley had been a tenant on the lands of Mr Lambert; he is but 22 years old, and since he was seventeen became infatuated with the young wife of the Franklin farmer. He says that he began to love her at that time and never has ceased. They came here closely followed by the officer from Youngville. They took a cab and drove to some place in the city where they would be little troubled. The Policeman, believing the cabmen would be good witnesses, went on their trail and soon had them locked up, though Mrs. Lambert has not been kept in prison.

The officer says he thinks the young fellow persuaded the woman to elope with him. He declares that she belongs to as good a family as there is in that country or anywhere, and that her taking up with a man of so much less her social and general equal is unaccountable."

A preliminary hearing was arranged here yesterday before, Justice of the Peace J. R. Tharrington, under a charge of felony, but the hearing being waived, Walter Oakley was bound over to court under a \$300 bond, and upon not succeeding in giving the bond he was taken to jail at Louisburg by constable S. E. Pearce.
